With eating cold pease-porridge.



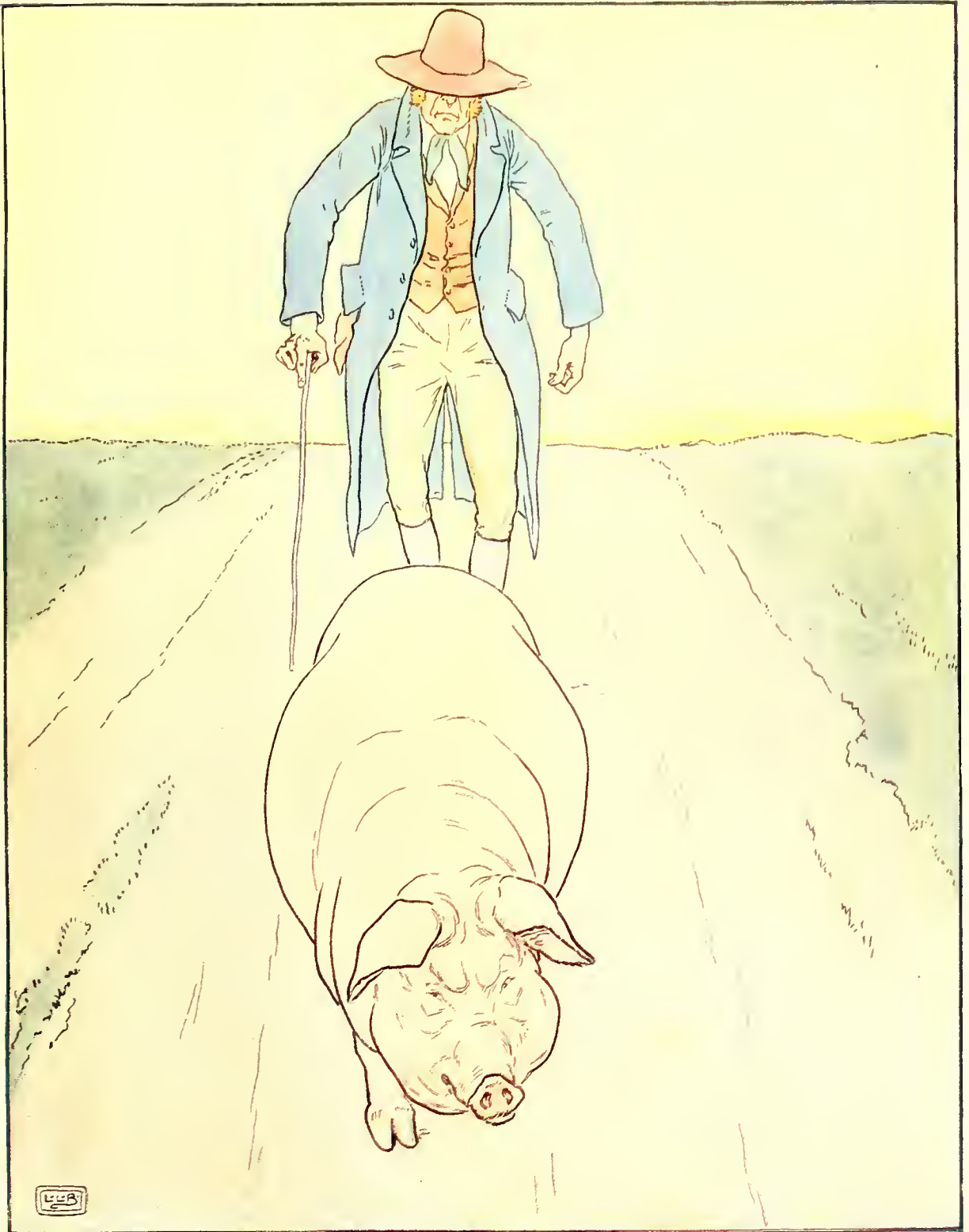

And robbers came to rob him ;

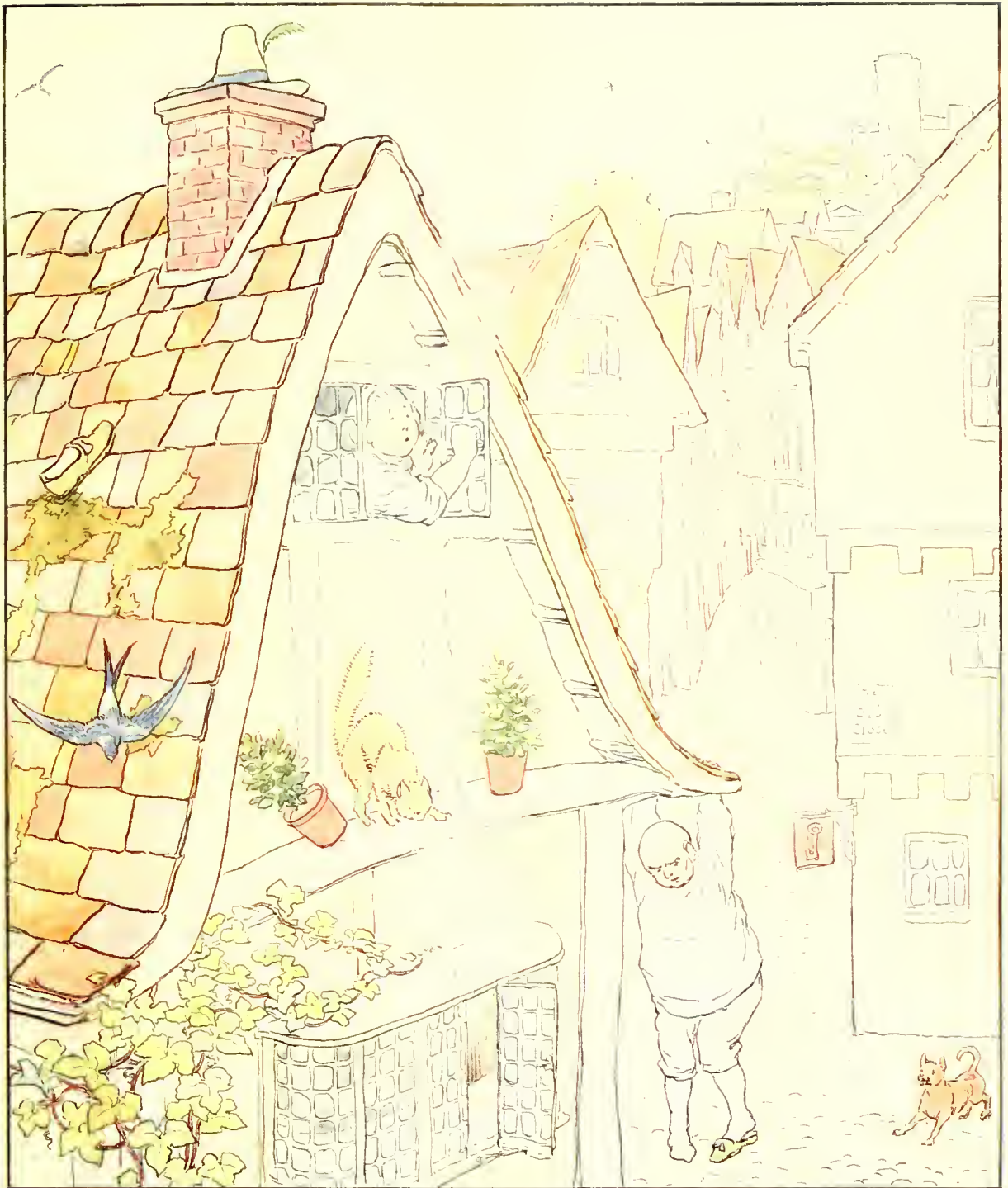


He crept up to the chimney-pot,

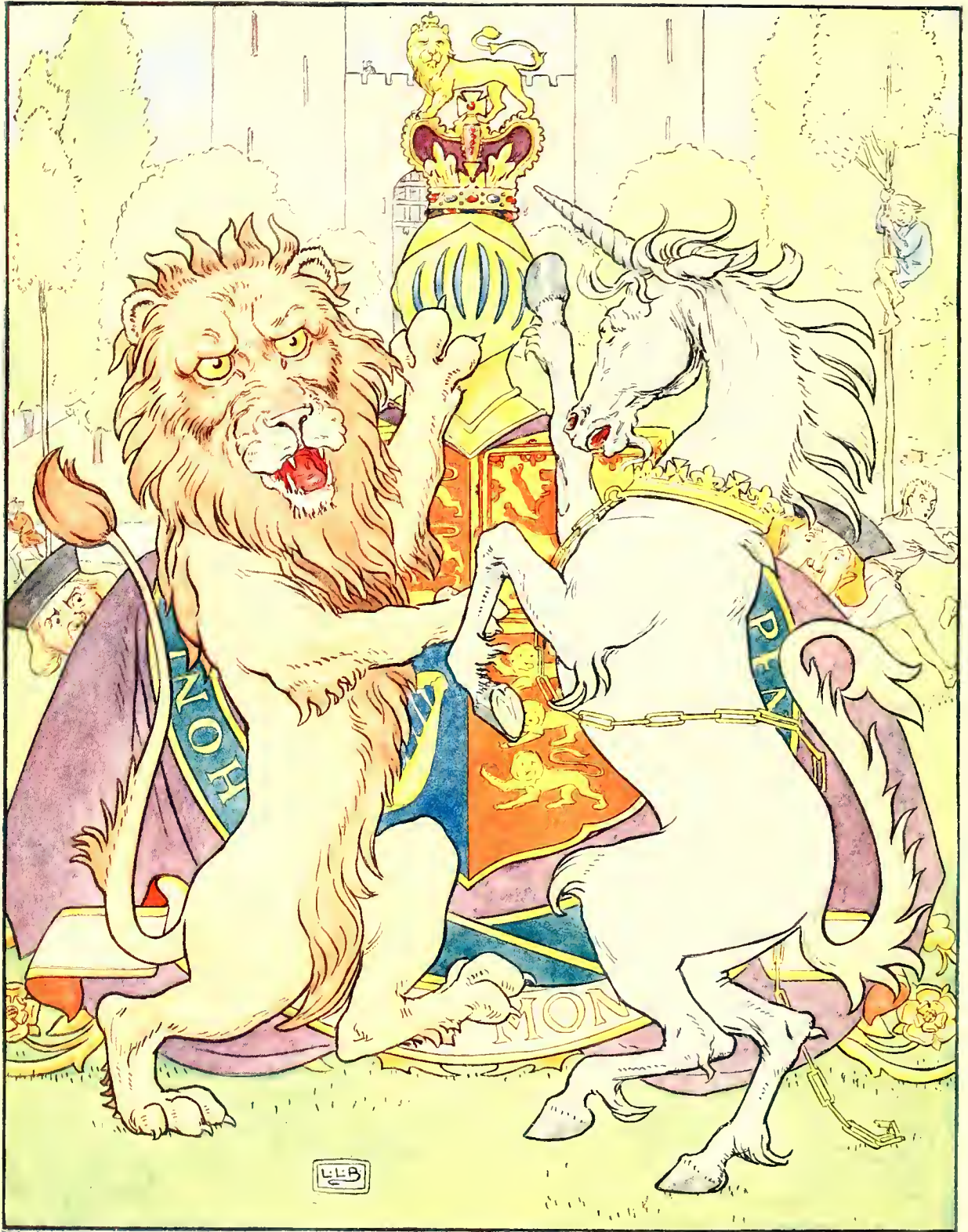

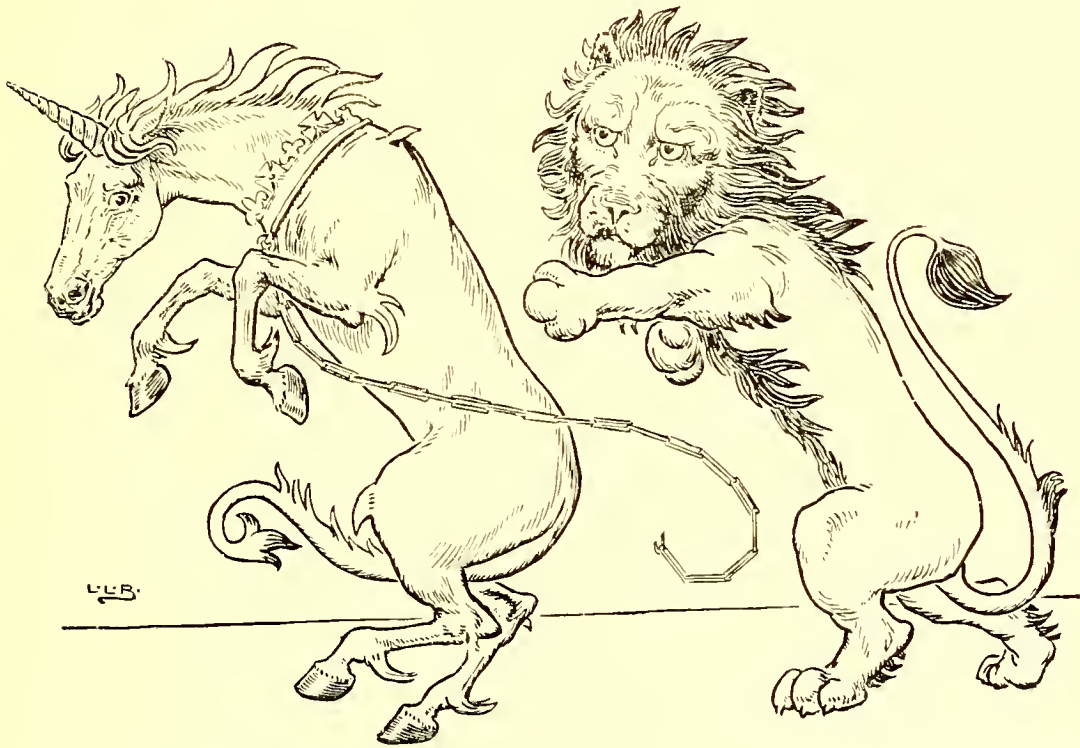

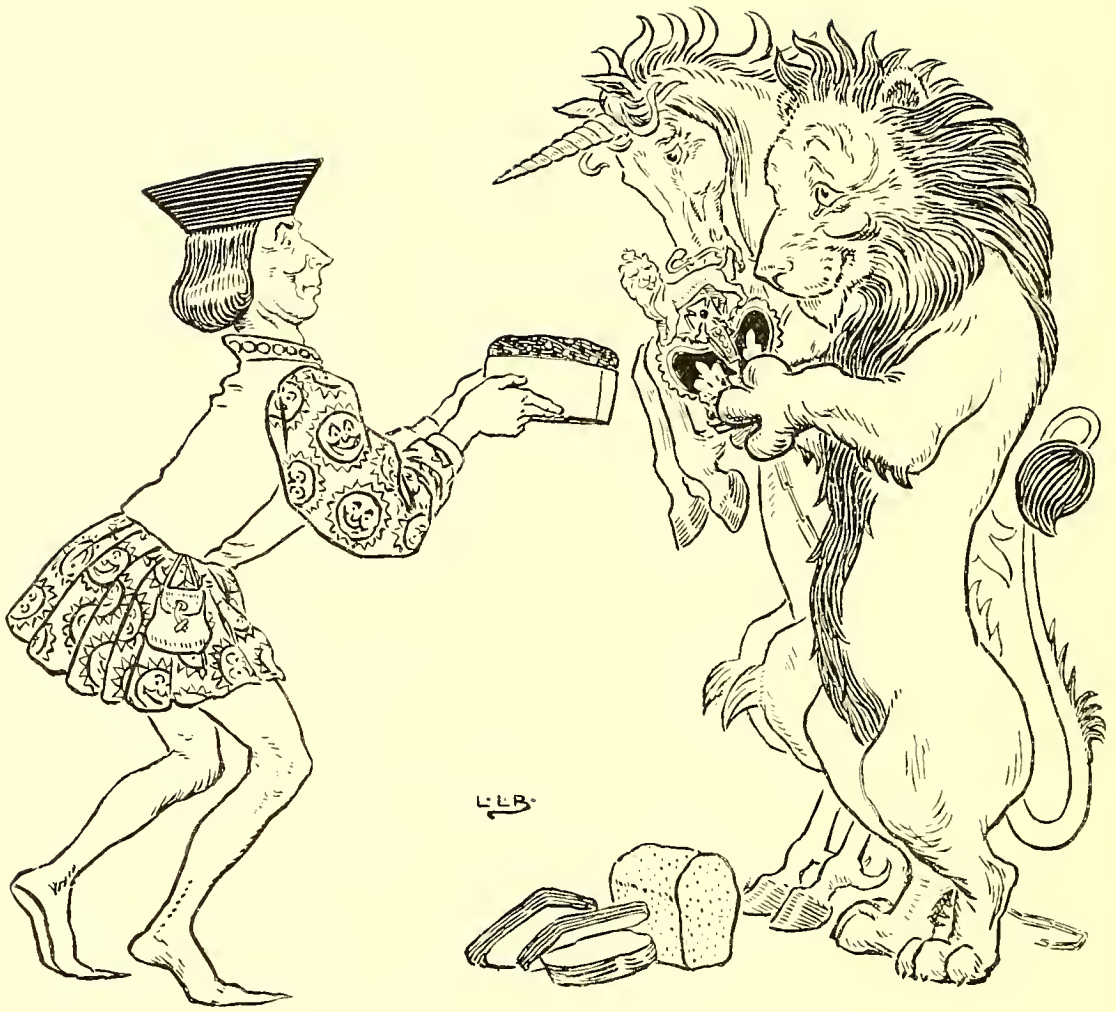

whey ;

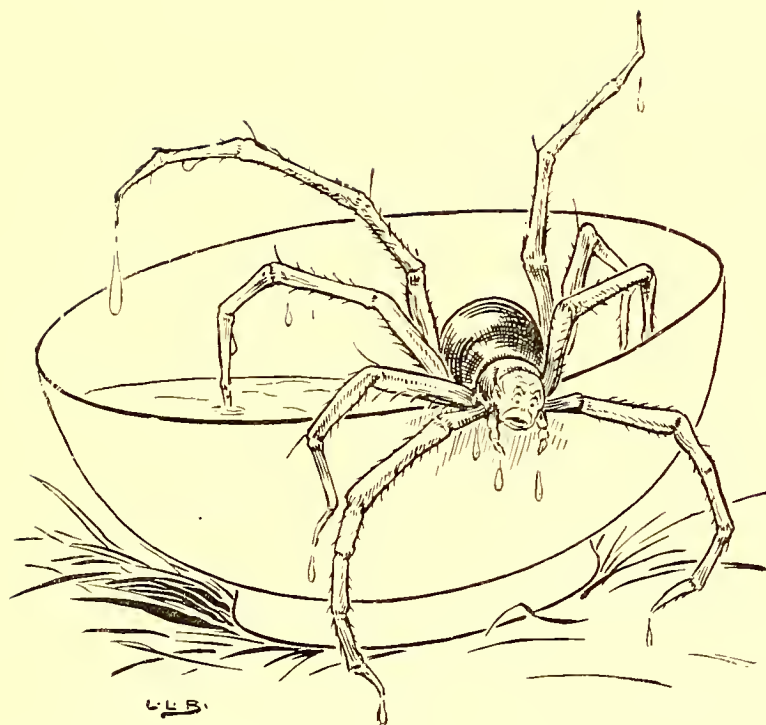


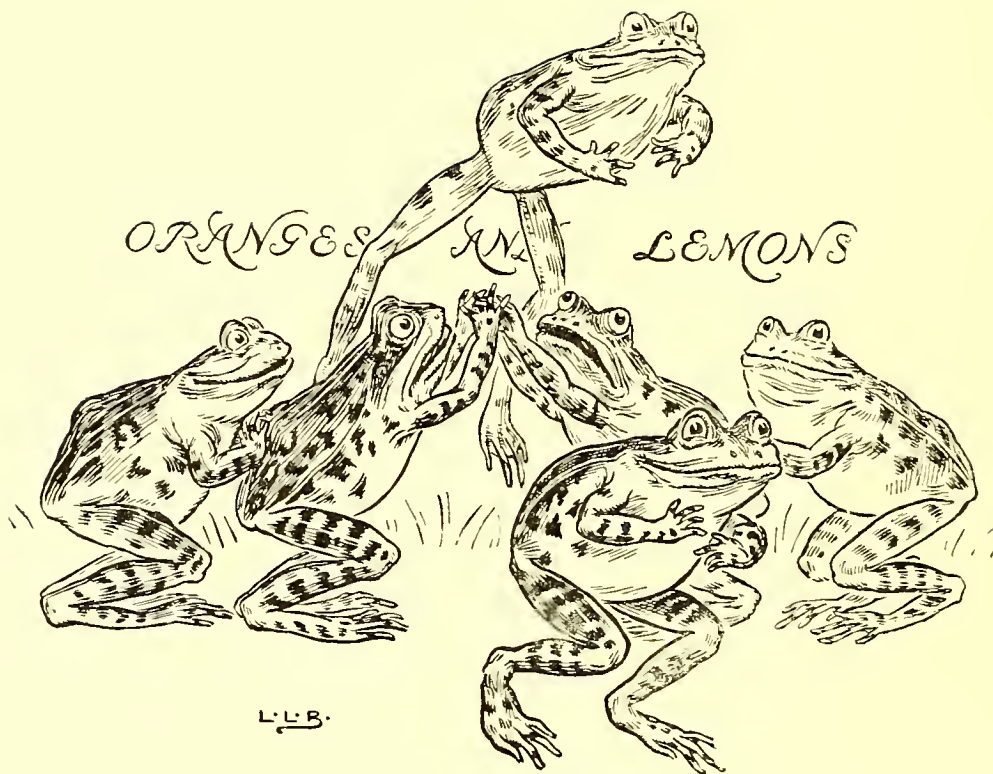

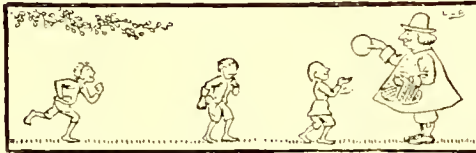
*Gay go up, and gay go down

Say the bells of St. Giles'. Say the bells of St. Peter's.

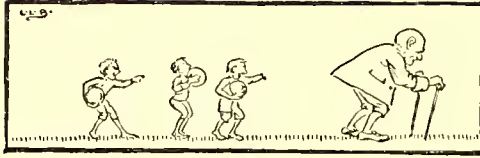
Two sticks and an apple,

Say the bells of St. Ann's.

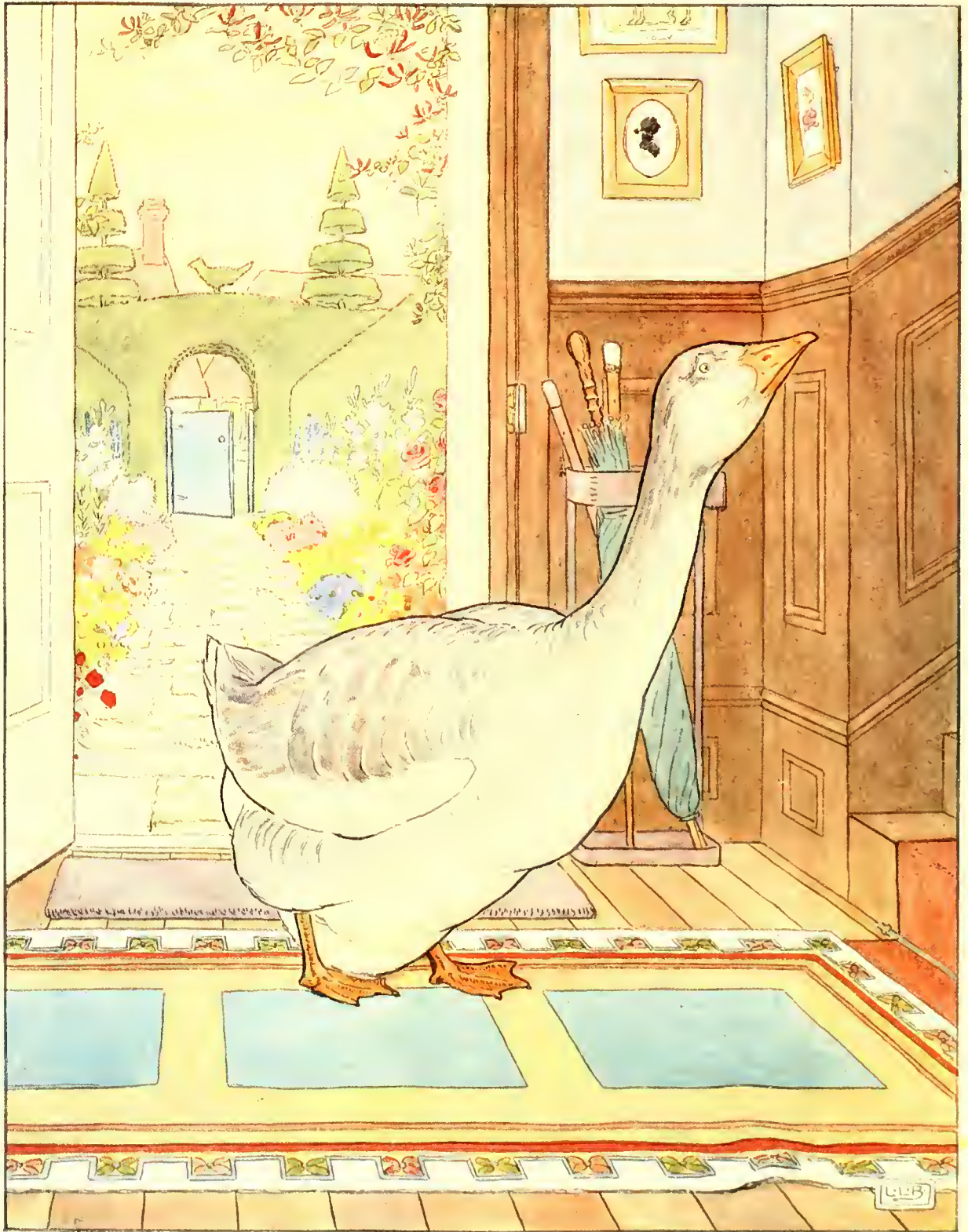
You owe me ten shillings, When I grow rich,

Say the bells at Old Bailey. Say the bells of Stepney.



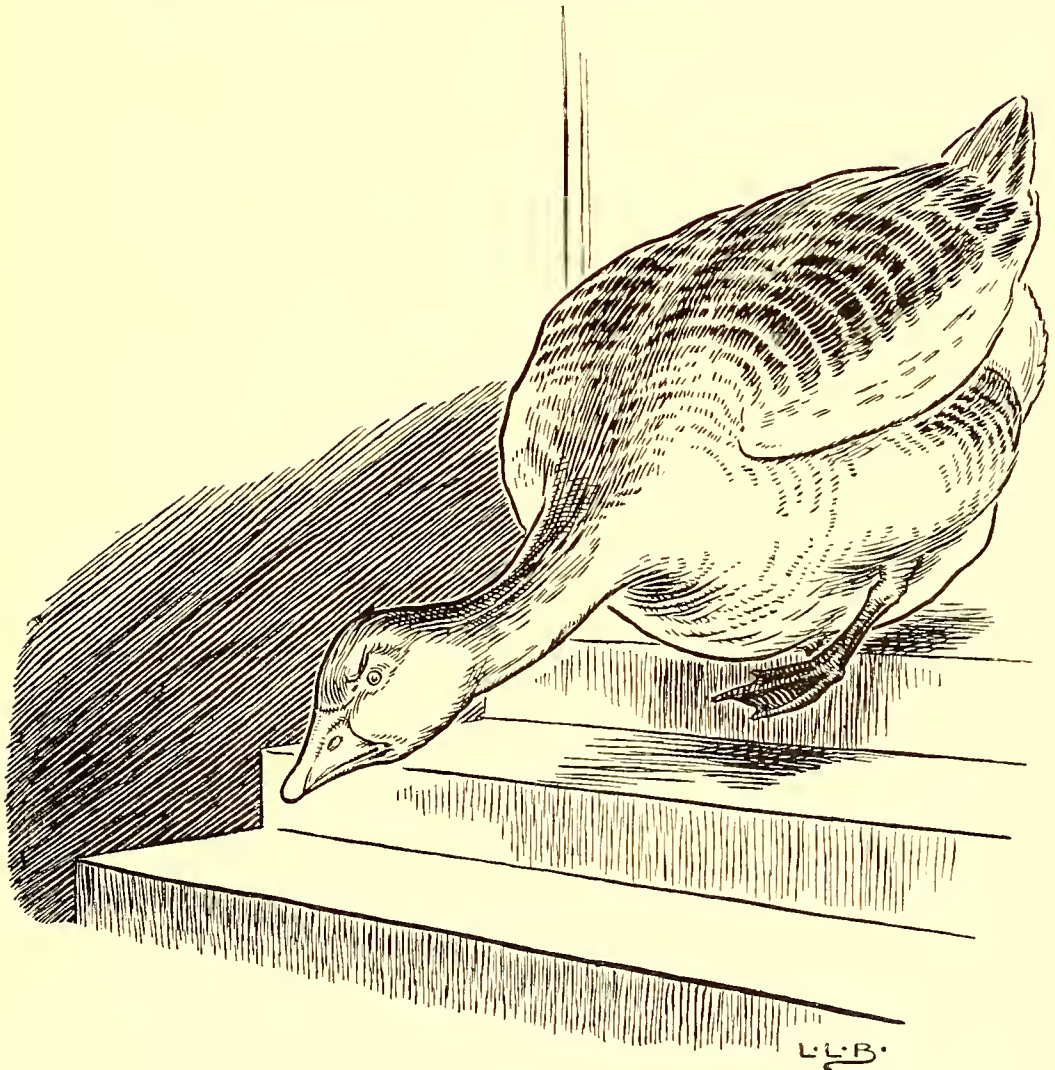
I am sure I don't know,

And here comes a chopper to chop off your head.*

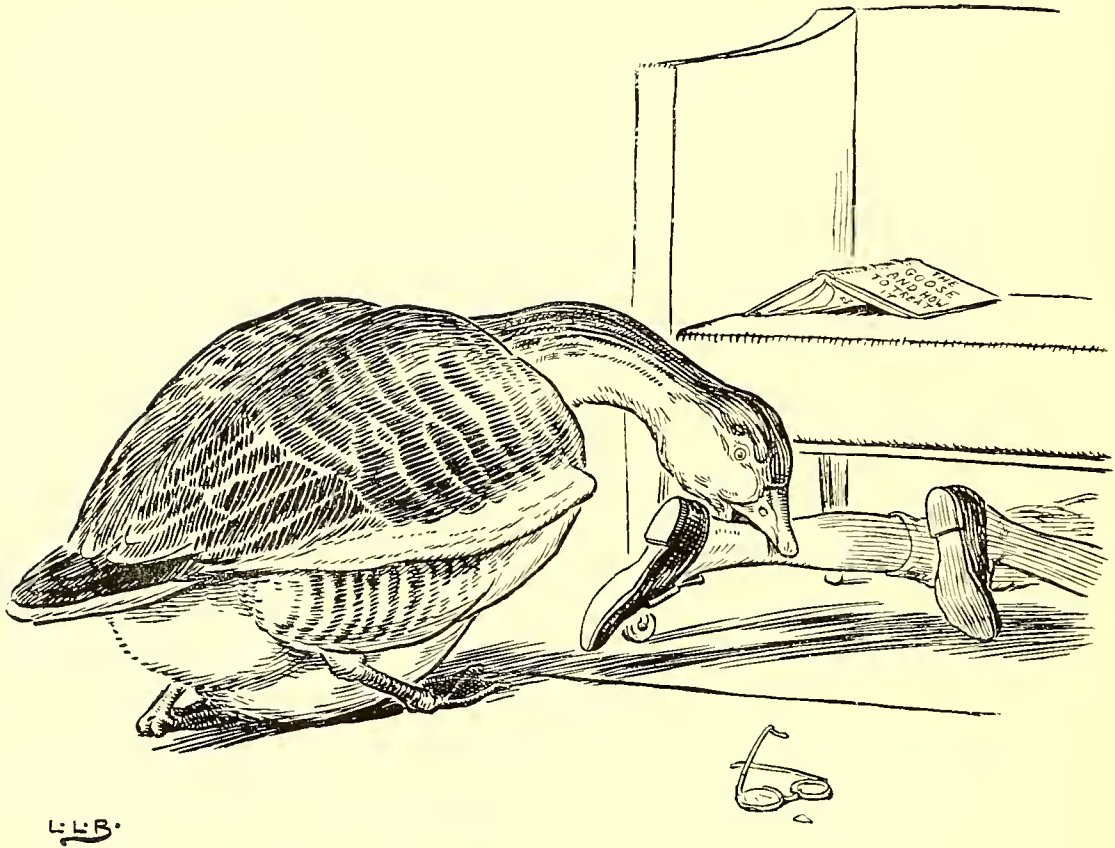

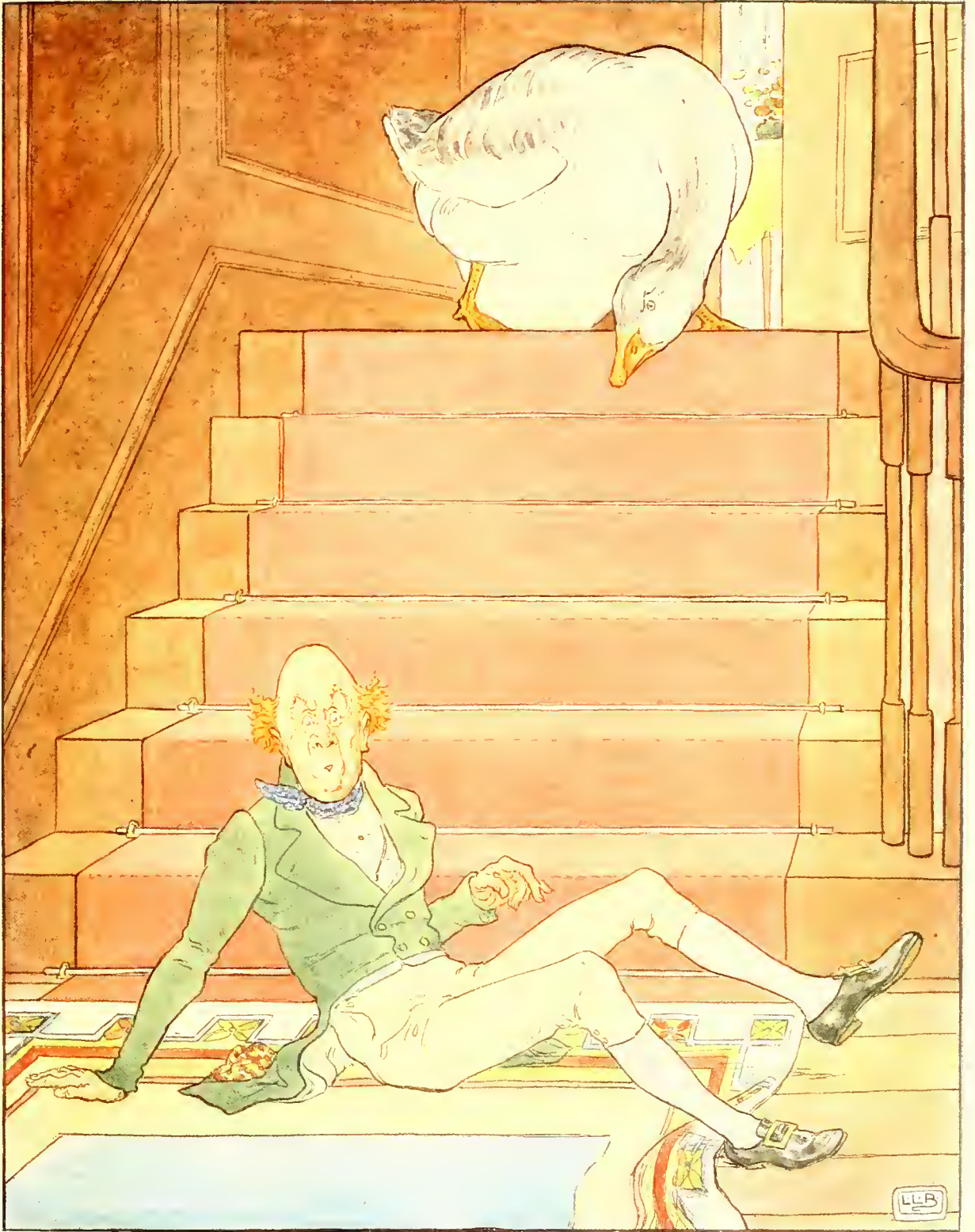
GOOSEY, Goosey Gander,

And in my lady's chamber.



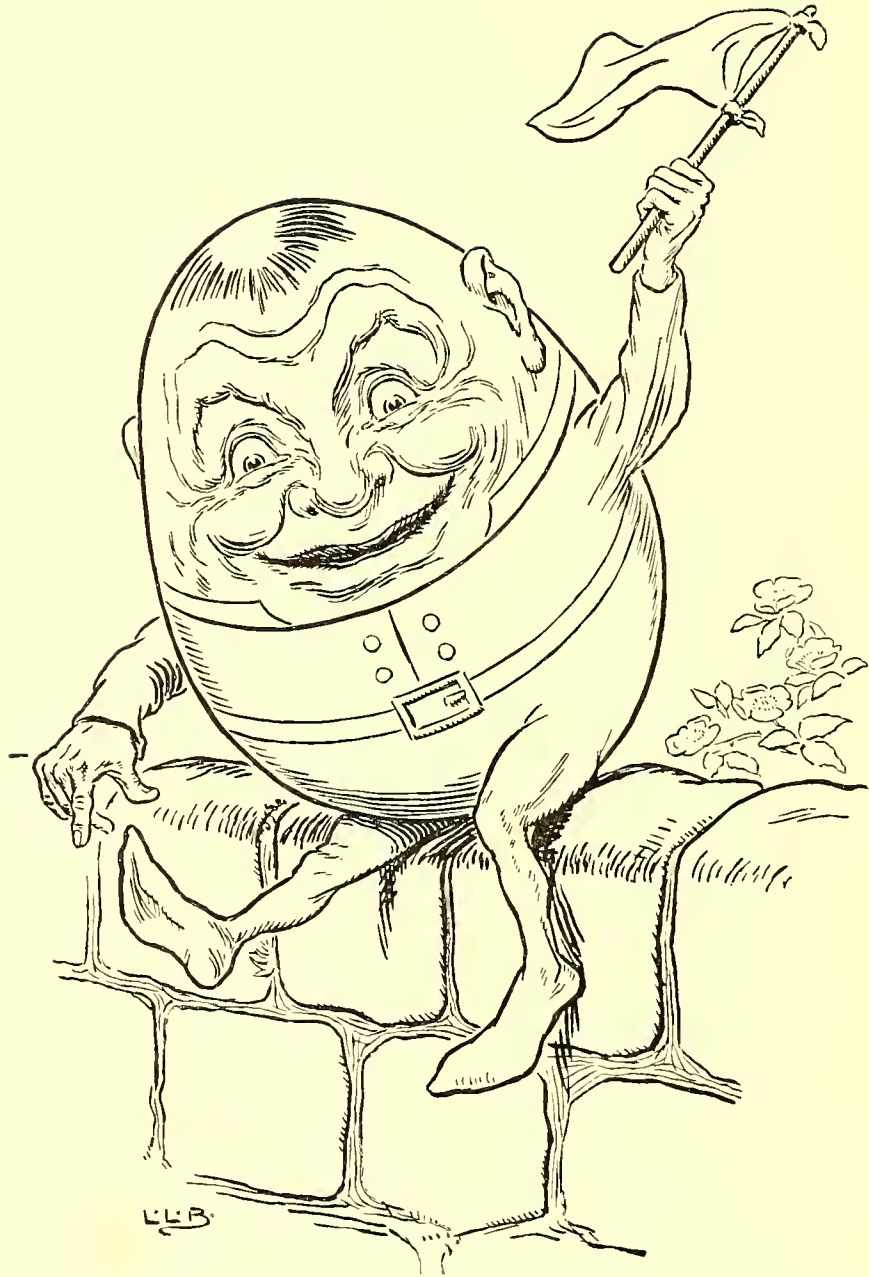
There I met an old man

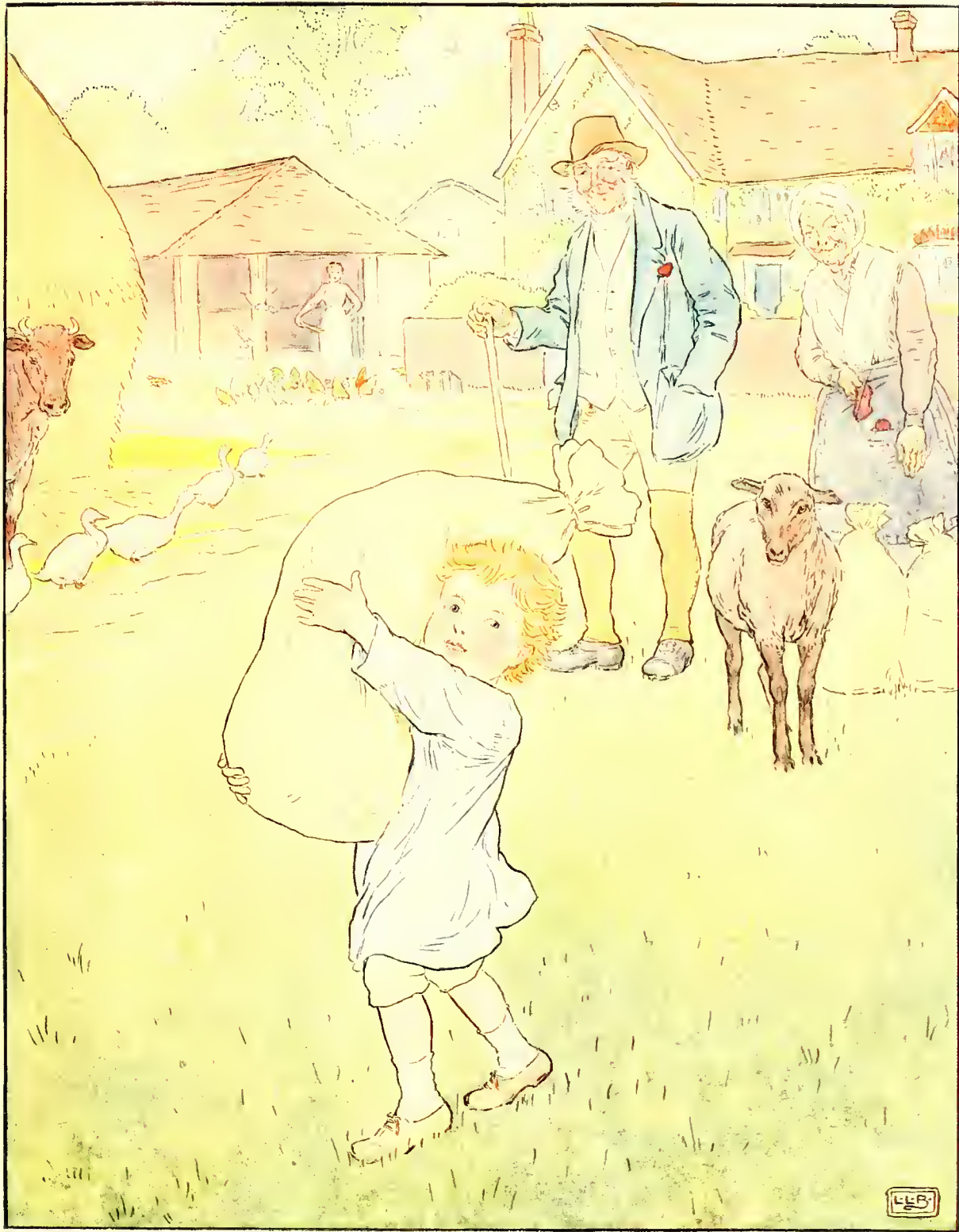


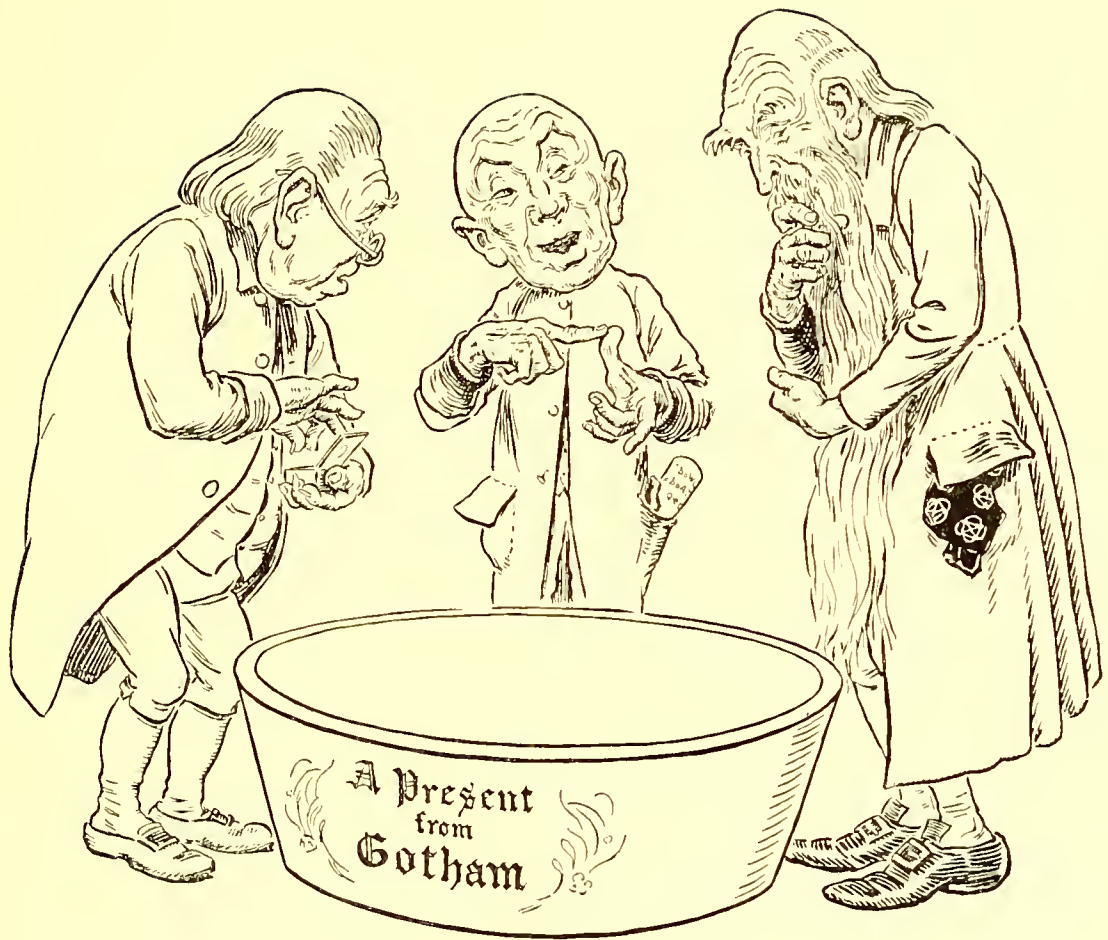
BAA, BAA, BLACK SHEEP.

Went to sea in a bowl :



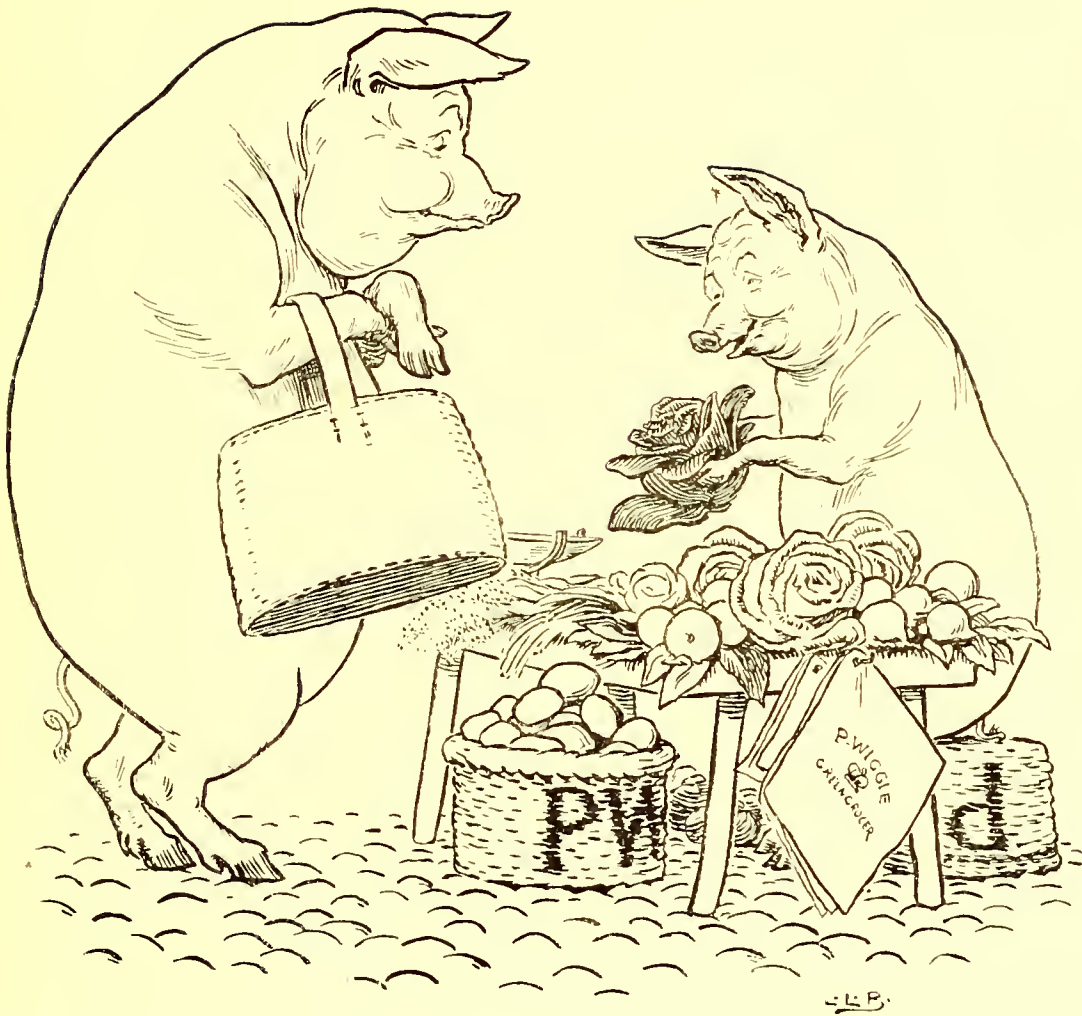

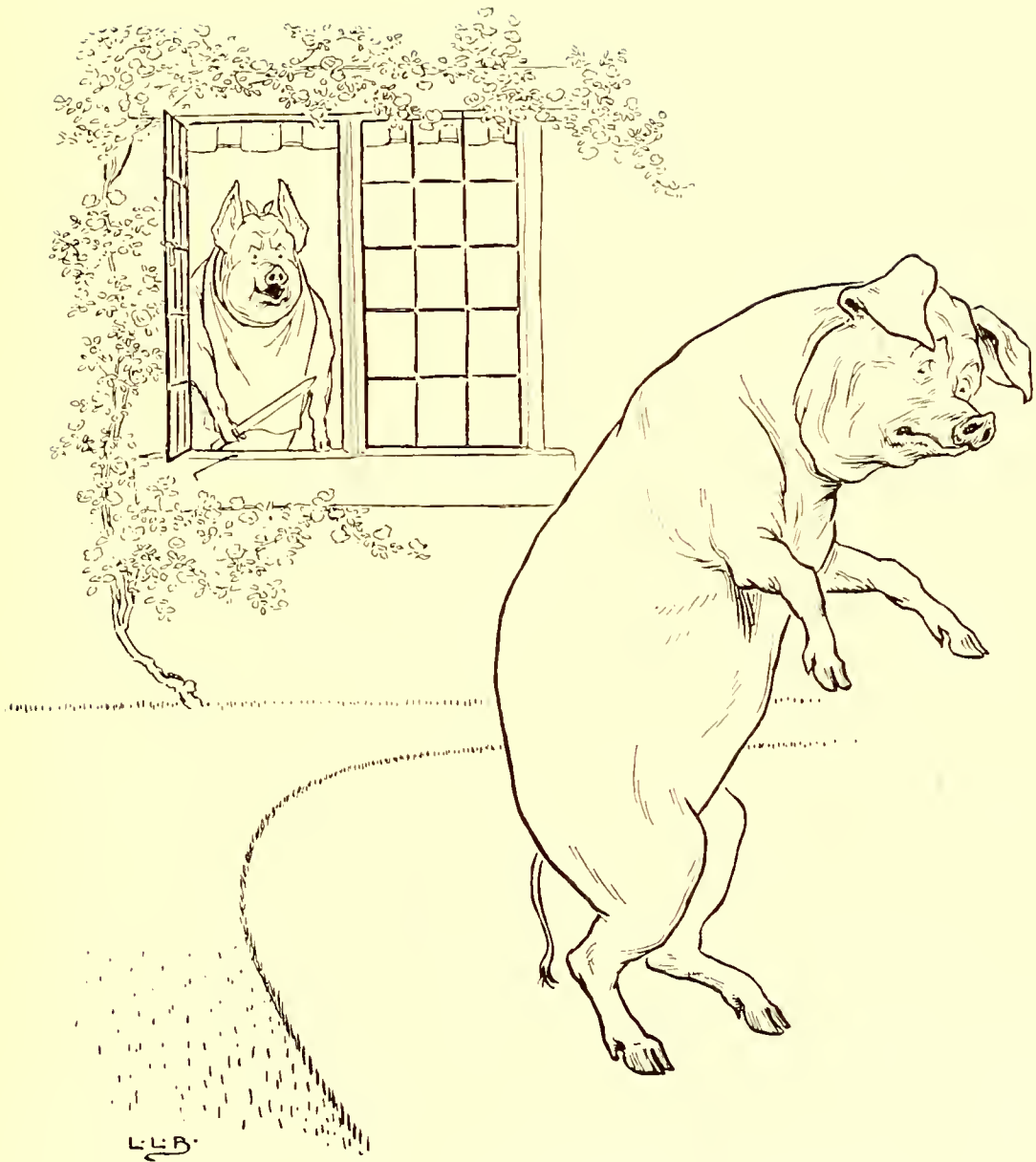

This little pig stayed at home ;

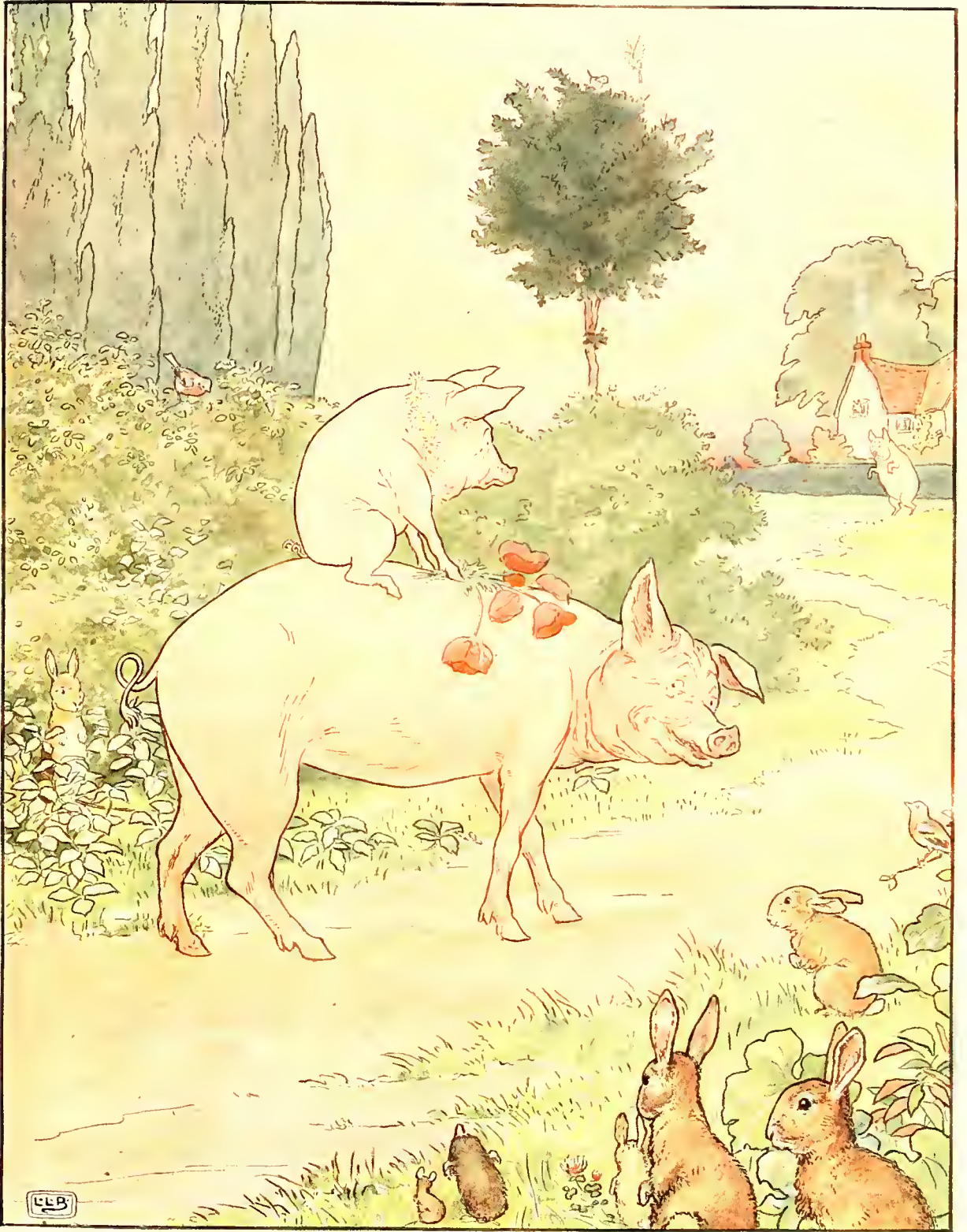

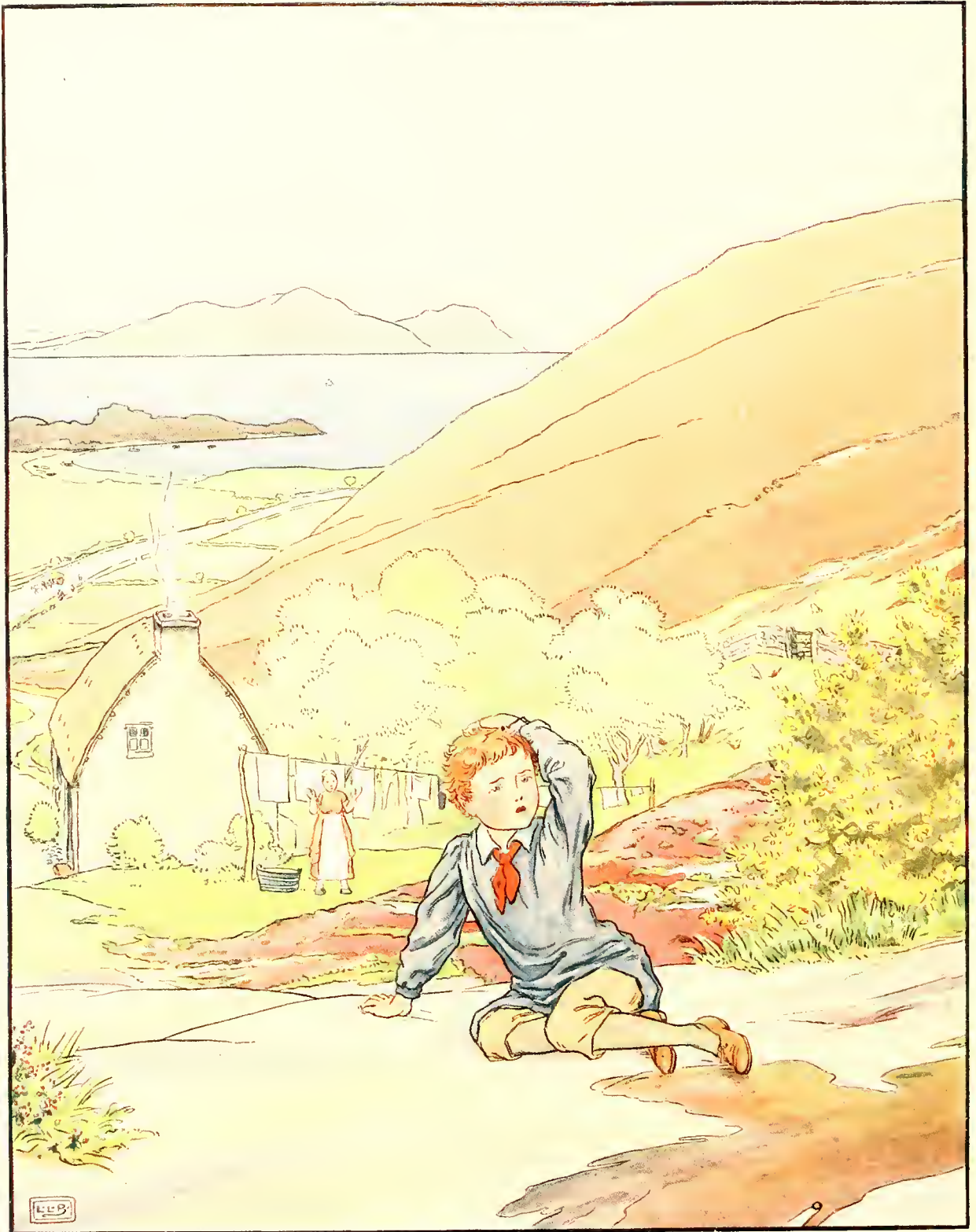

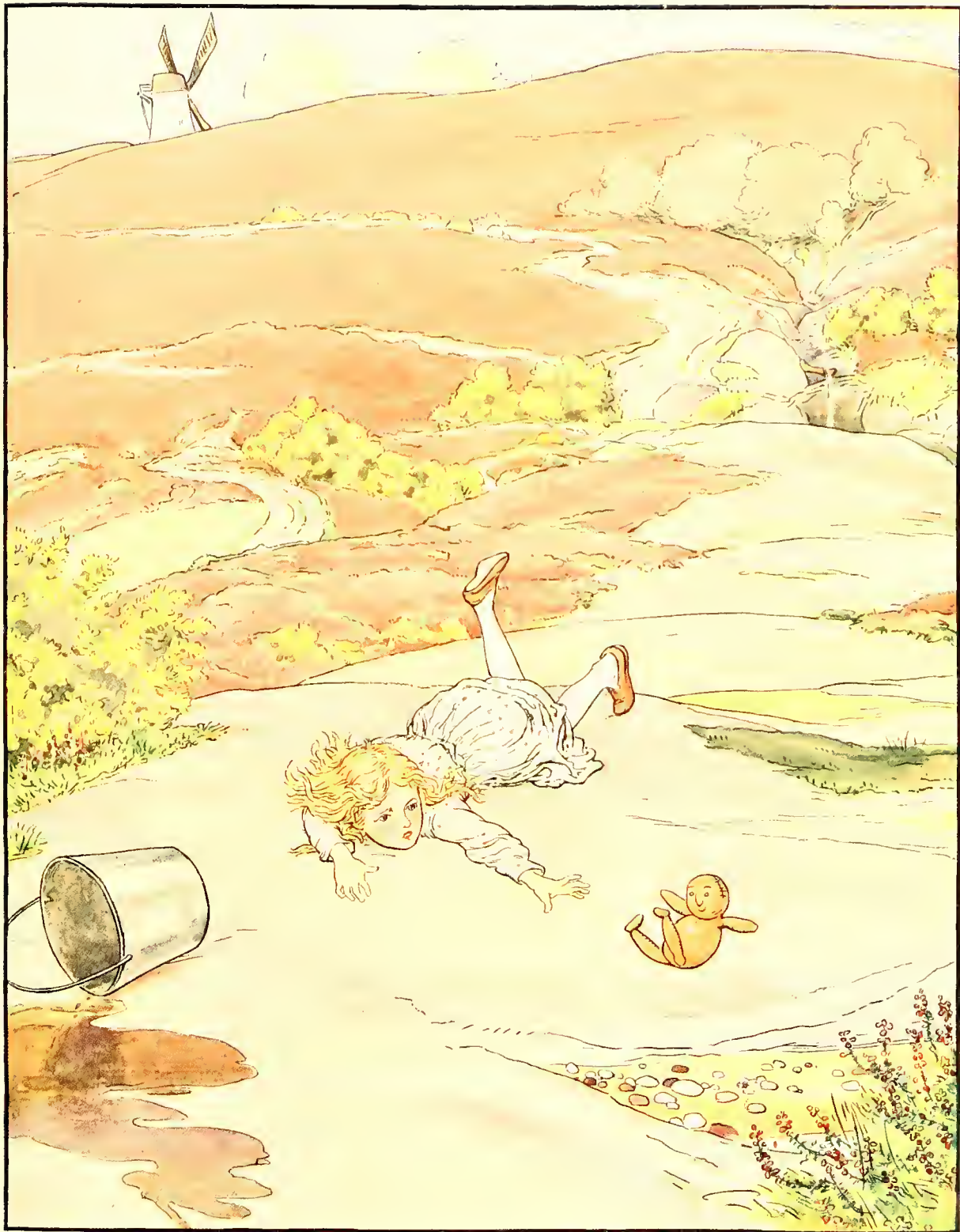

SIMPLE SIMON.

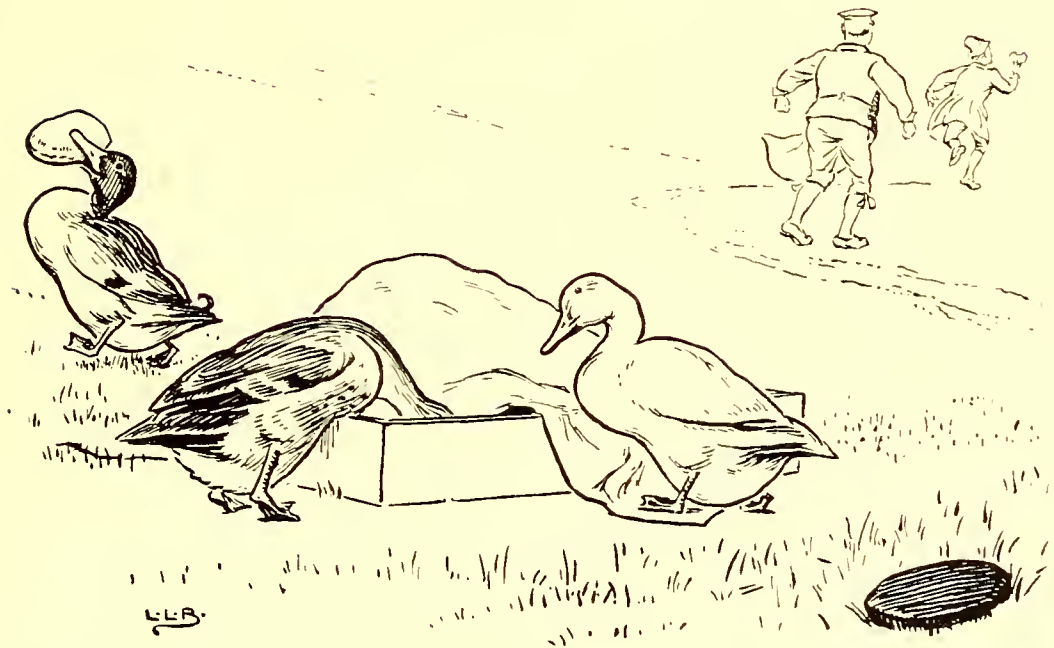
SIMPLE SIMON met a pieman,

“Do you mean to pay?”

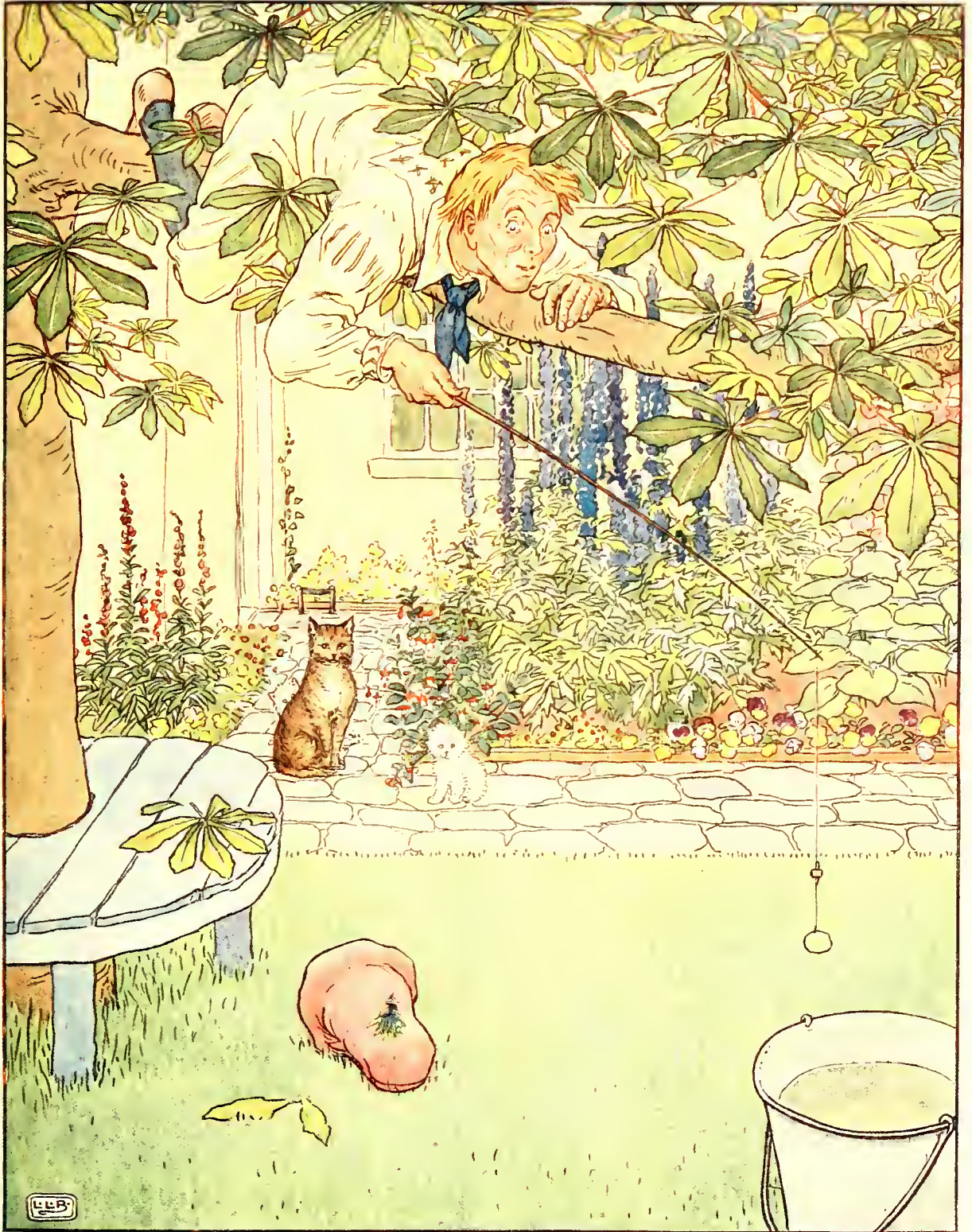
Says Simon, “Yes, of course I do!”

stile :



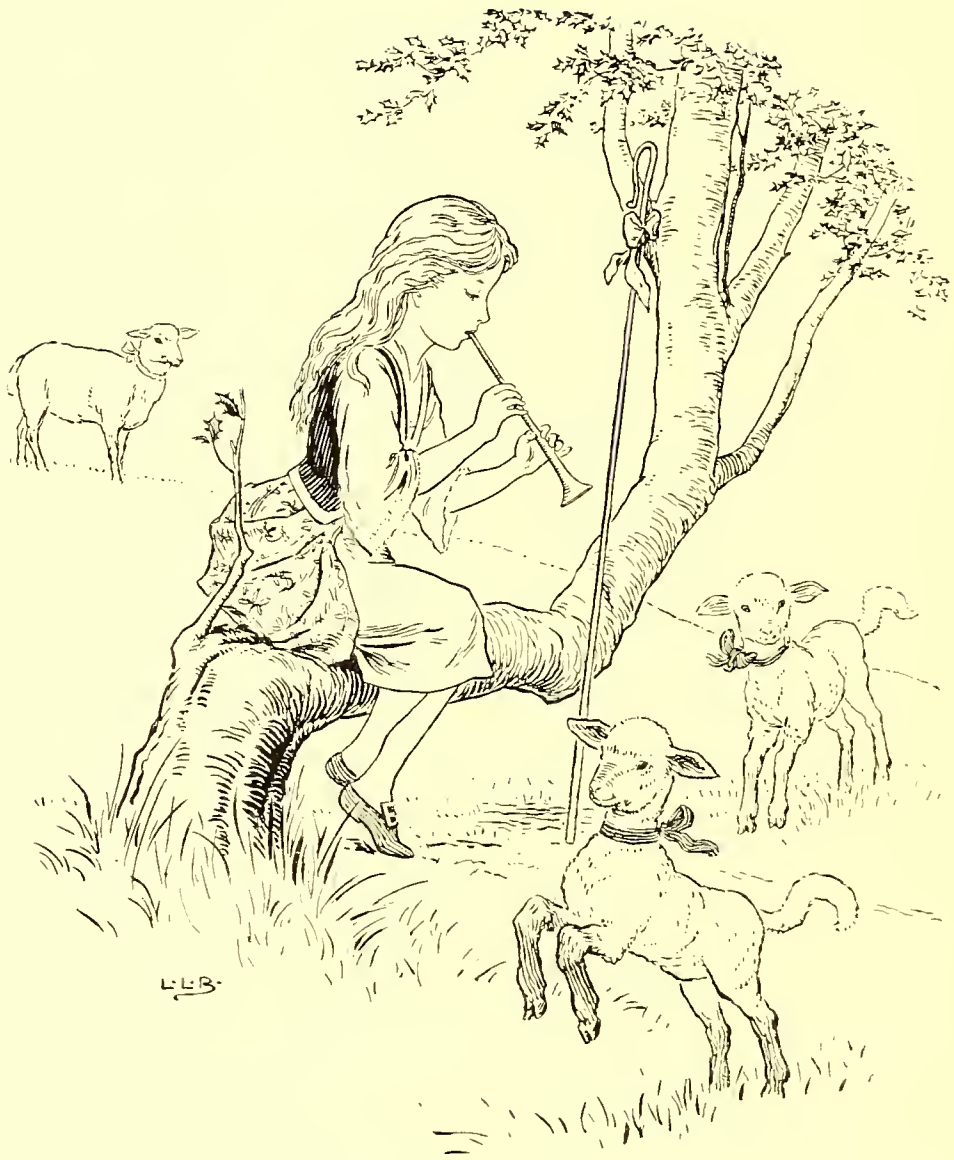

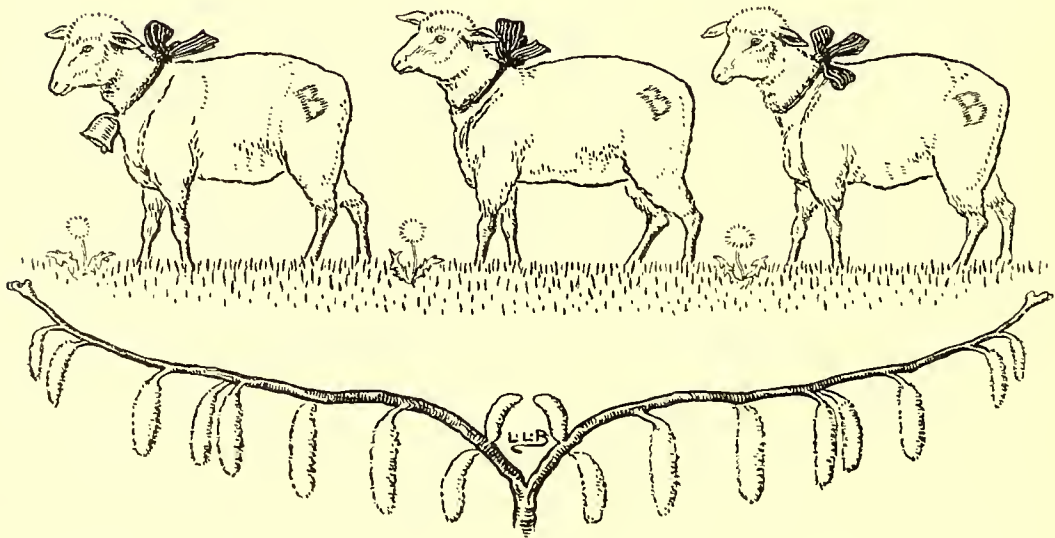


LITTLE BO-PEEP.

To make a bag-pudding.

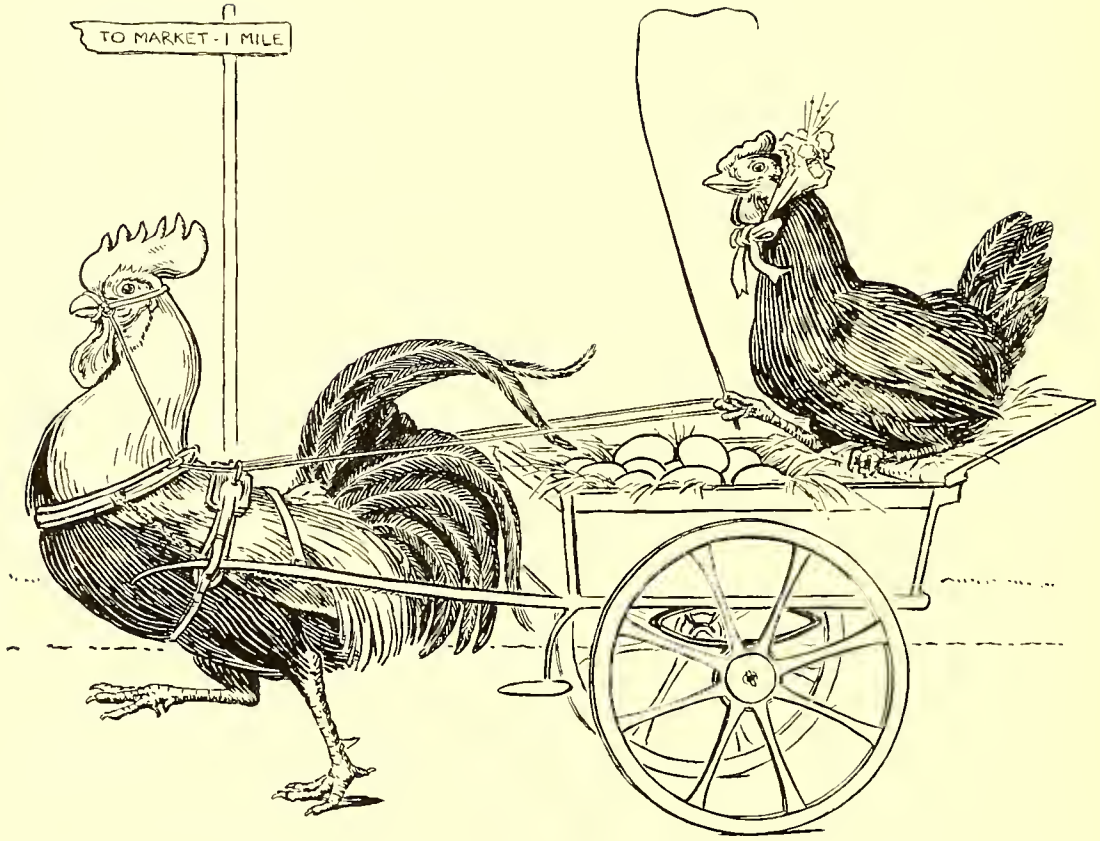
A bag-pudding the king did make,

The queen next morning fried.



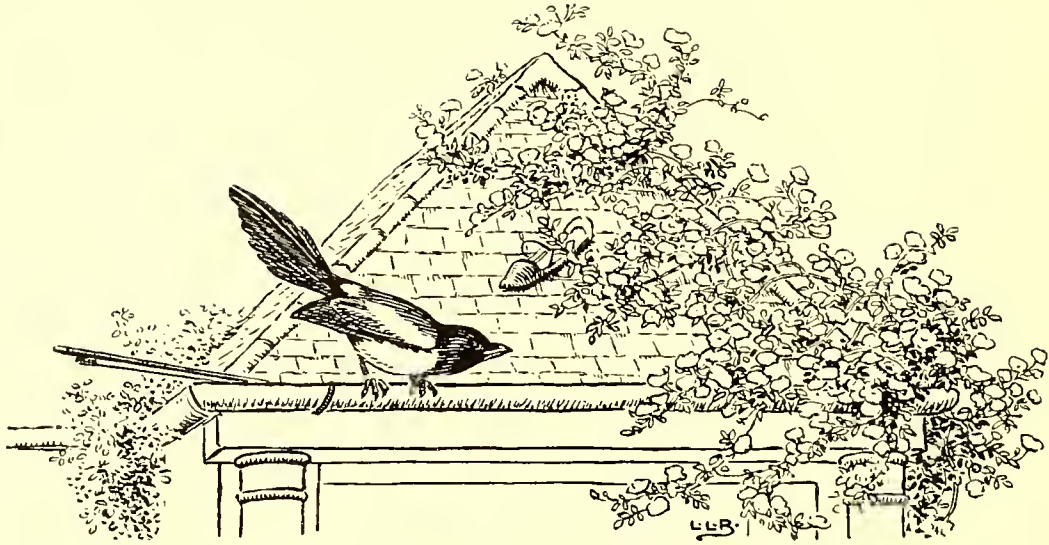
HICKETY PICKETY MY BLACK

And can't tell what to do.

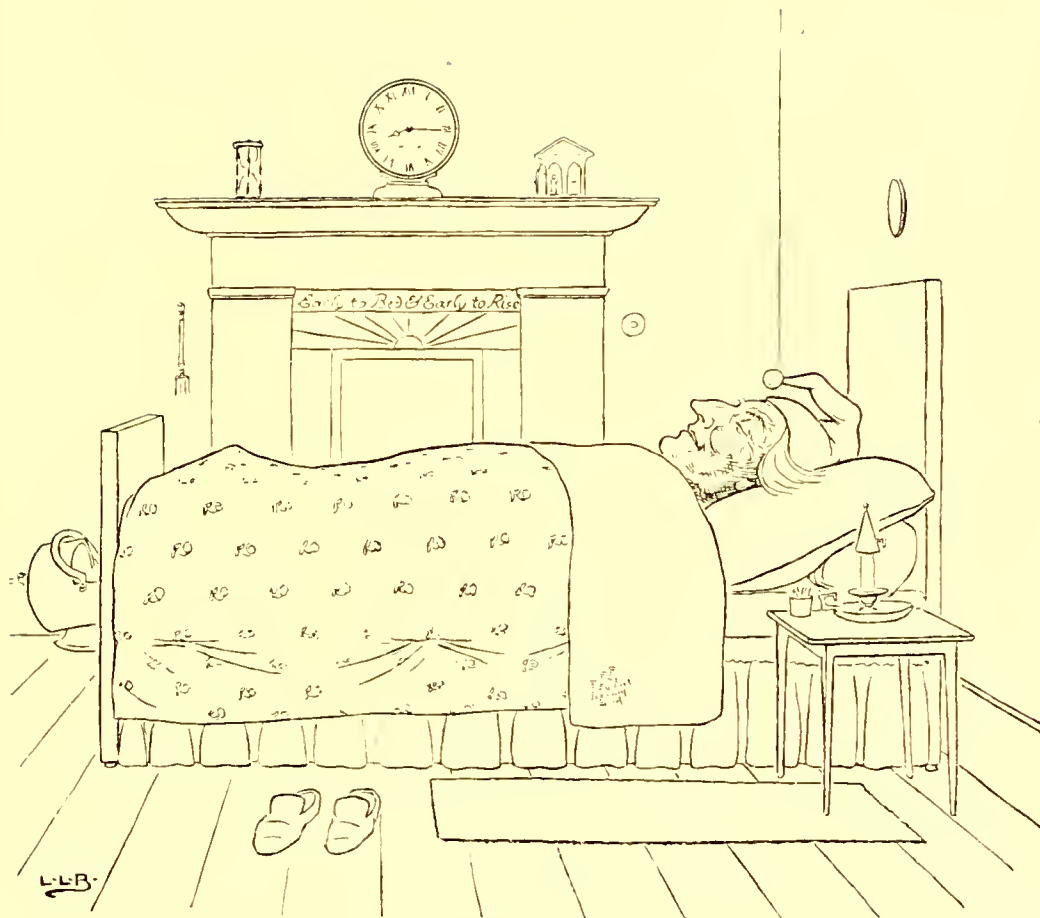




WEE WILLIE WINKIE.

o’clock?”





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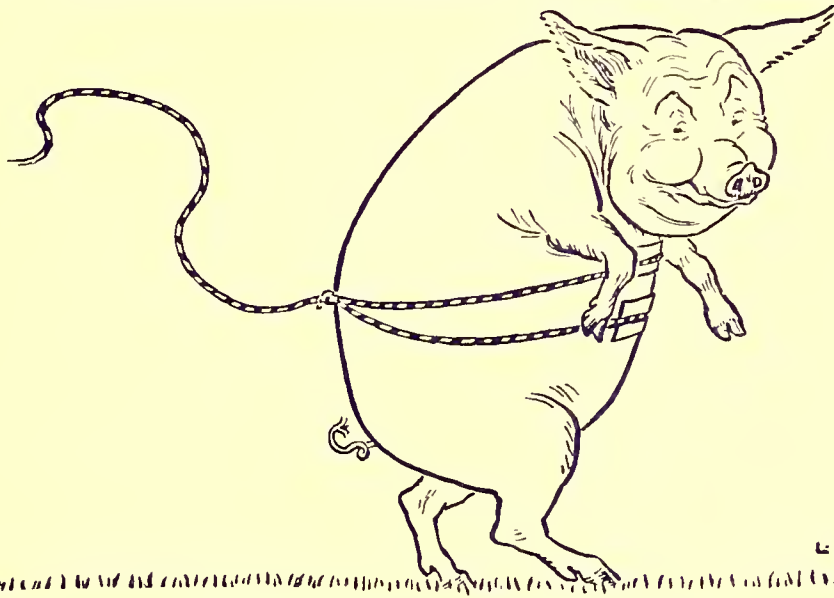
