And one is for Baby Sally.

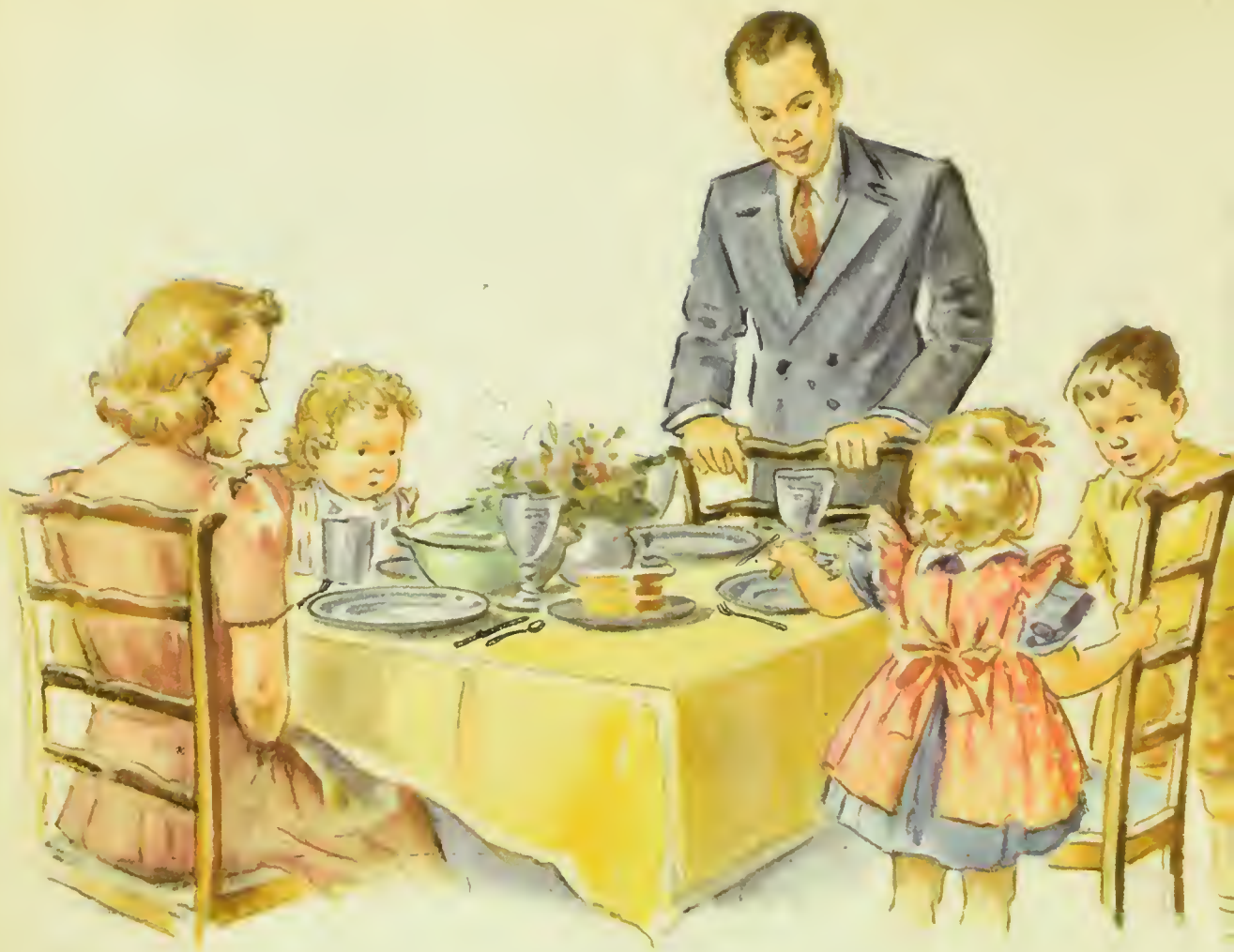
One, two, three, four.

We can get it here."

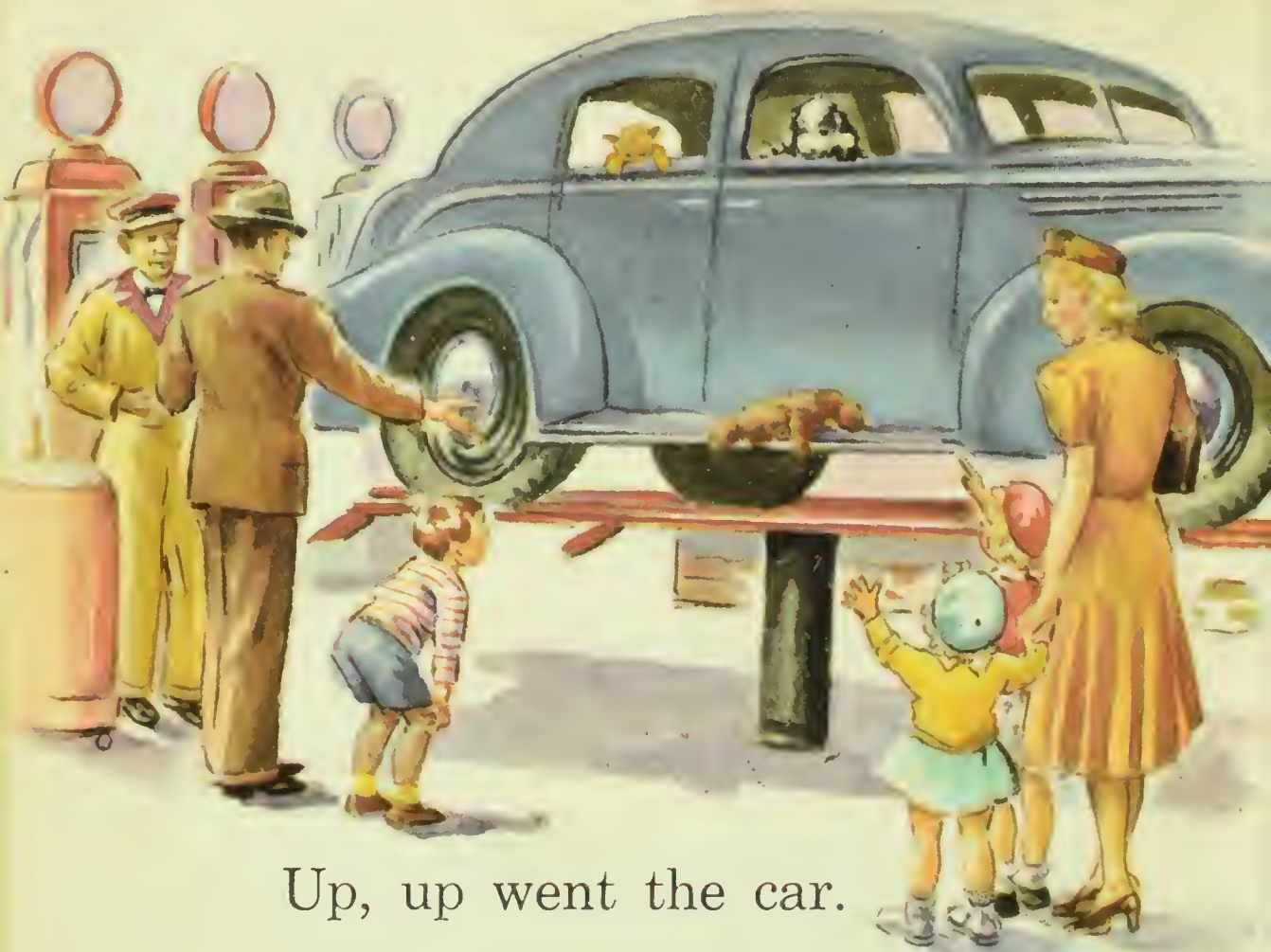
"Oh, Father!" said Sally.

“See the car go up.

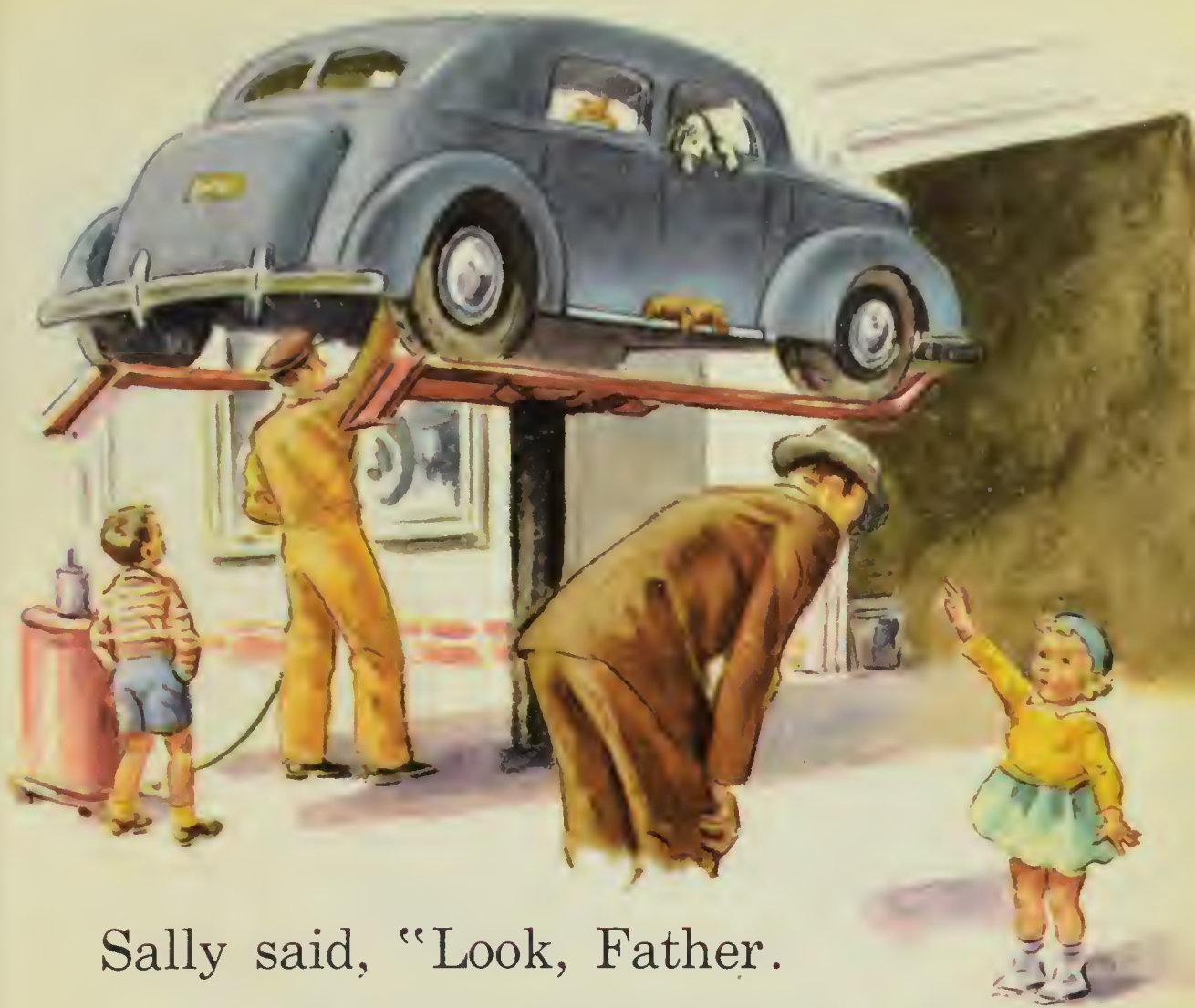
The car can go for a ride.

“You ride up.

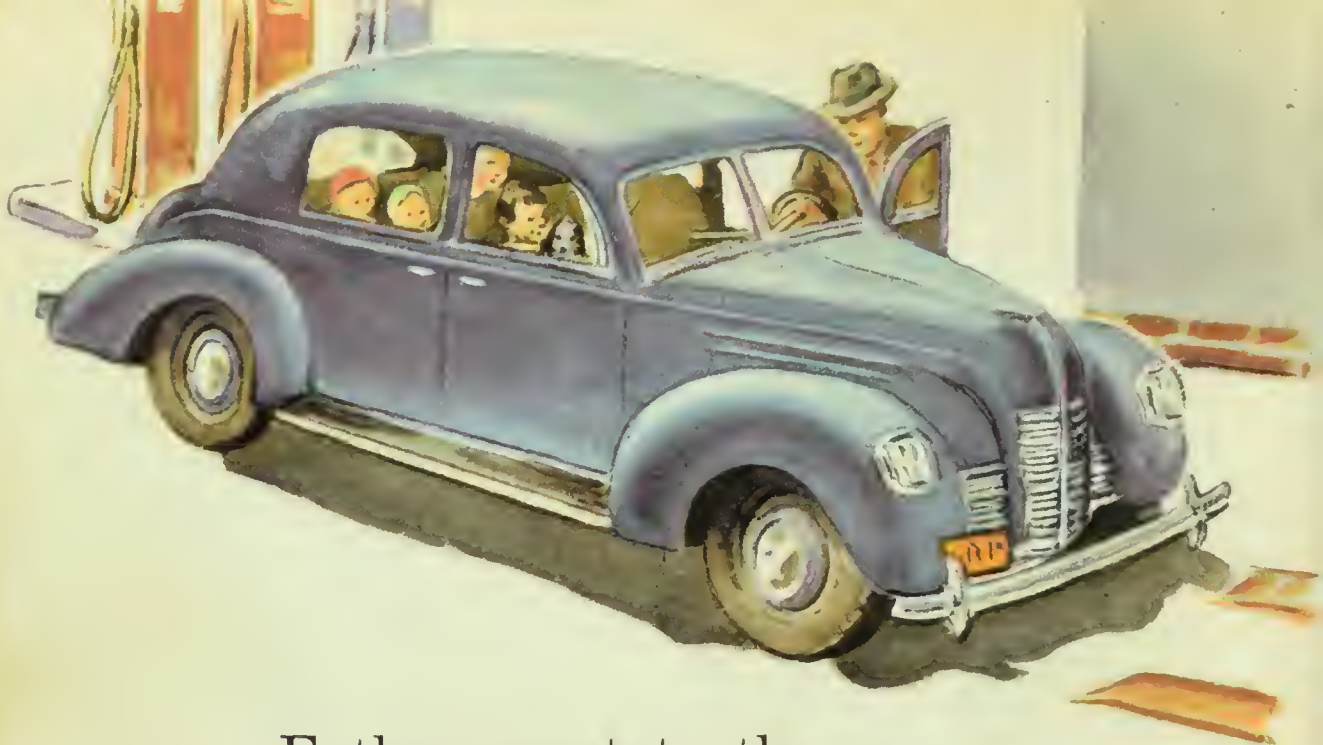
You ride down.

We can go out and play.”

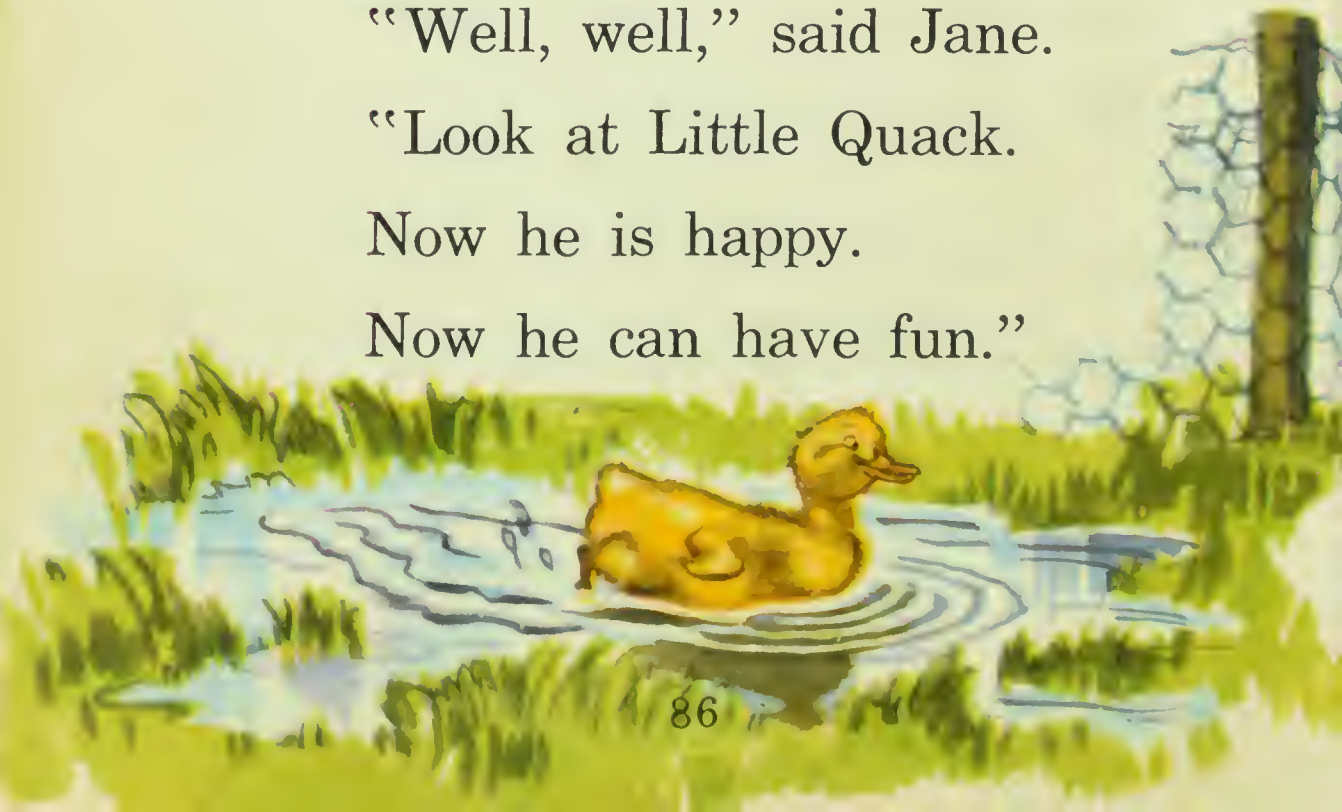
Dick and Jane went out.

I must help you."

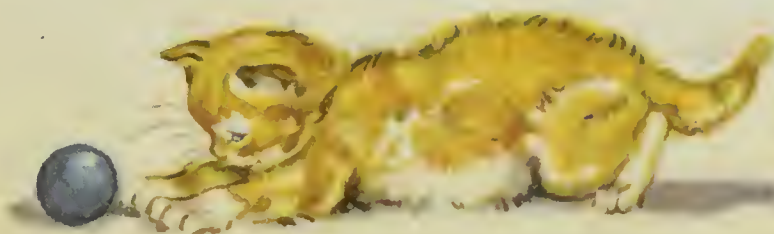
"Mew, mew," said Puff.

A girl came to play with Jane.

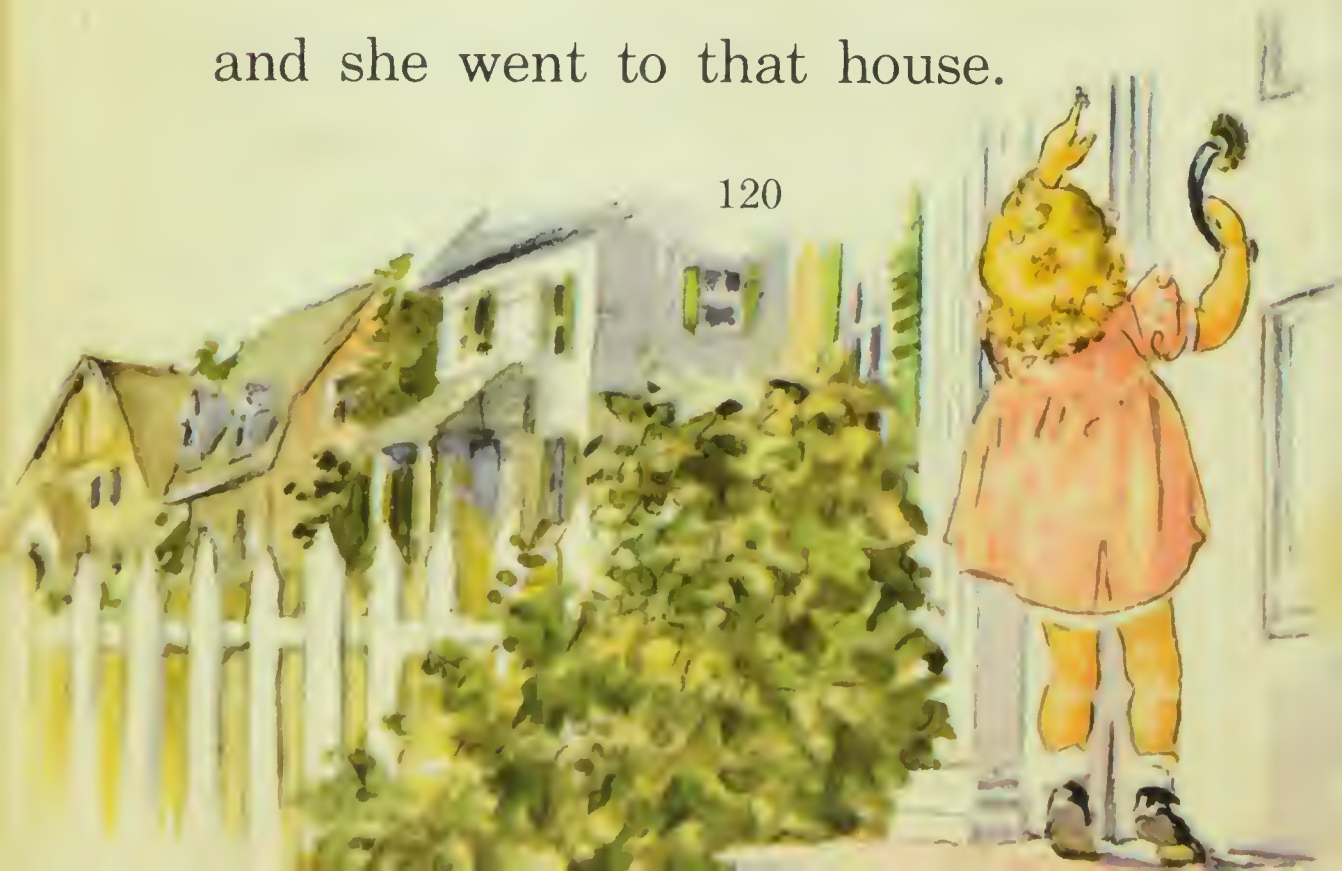
I want a friend to play with me.

“Oh, oh!” said all the children.

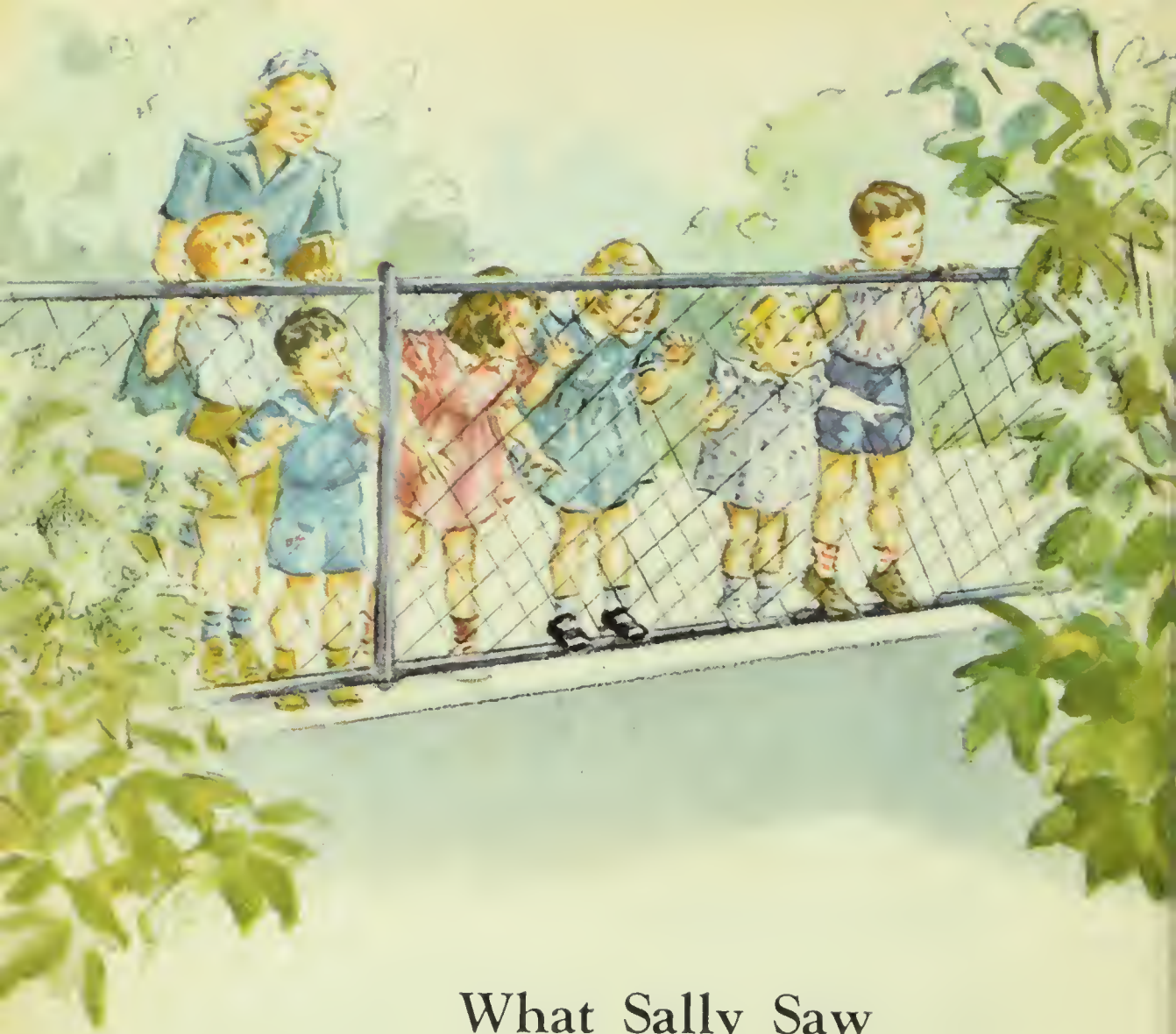
“There is Baby Sally.”

“I see something funny.

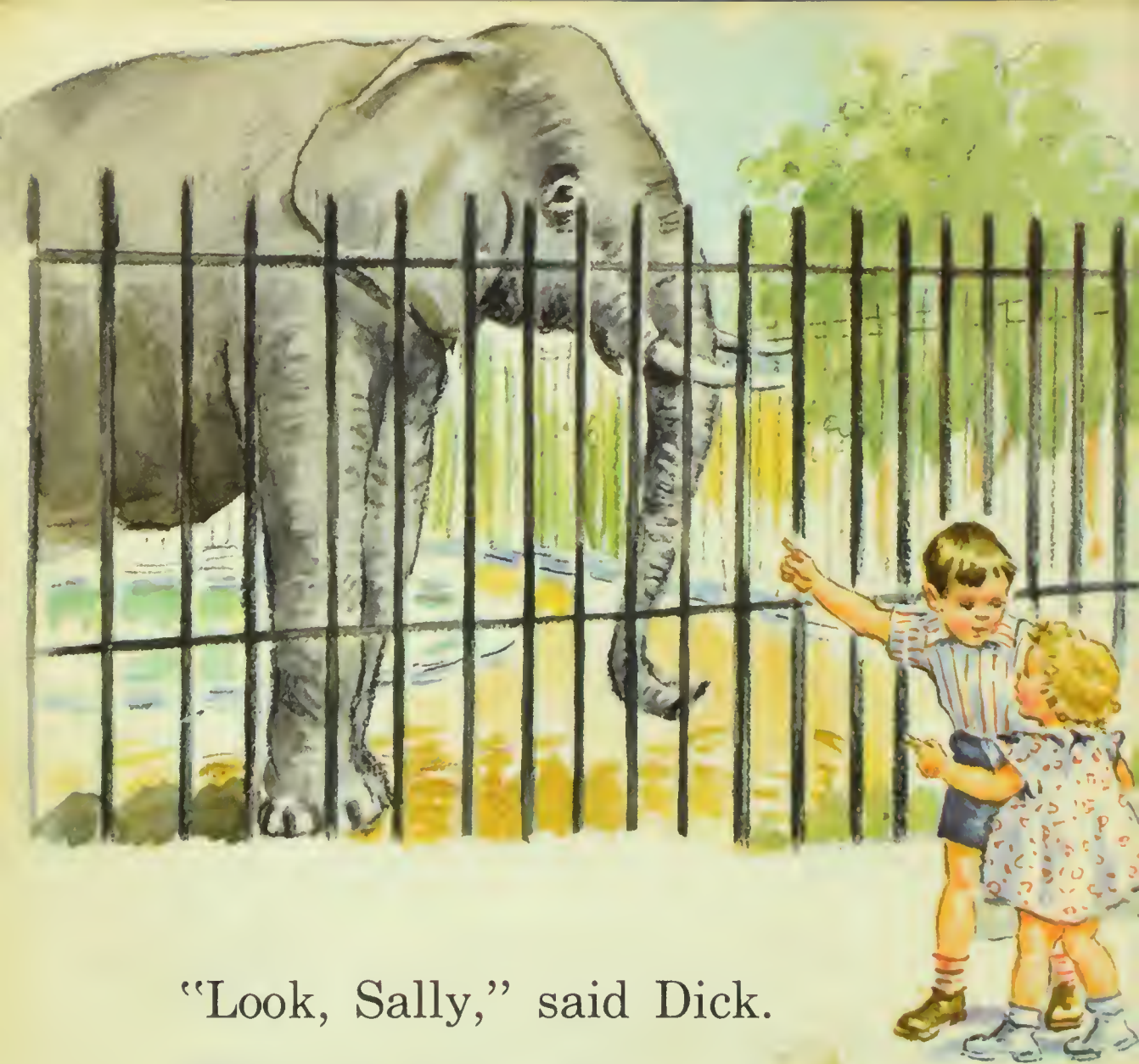
See the animal with two tails.
